Who is neutral on the bill: Marty Karlon, NH Retirement System (NHRS)

Summary of testimony presented in support:

Rep. Merner introduced the bill.

• This bill was filed last year for a one-time \$500 cost-of-living-adjustment (COLA) payment for retirees receiving under \$30,000 in pension.

Sandra Anwa, President of Retired Educators of NH

- The original bill was far more beneficial to members.
- The person who makes \$30,001 gets nothing.
- This is better than nothing at all.

Rich Gulla, President, State Employees Association (SEA)

- Represents over 10,000 employees.
- Supports this bill but it did start out as a COLA that will cost the state less in the long run.
- This should include all retirees.
- There is record inflation over the last 12 months.
- The cost of gasoline is up 48% and bacon is up 18%.
- Core inflation jumped 6.5% in the past 12-months.
- This bill should be a COLA, but if it is a 13th check, it should include everyone as there are more than enough funds.

Karen Irwin

- Submitted written testimony to the committee.
- Ms. Irwin is a 31-year state employee.
- This bill can still be a one-time COLA instead of a one-time payment that can be rolled forward for everyone.
- Suggested 1.5% in addition to the one-time payment.
- Suggested there could be a revolving one-time COLA allowance for every 5 years.
- Something is better than nothing.
- It was too big a stretch to pre-fund this with \$79 million.
- There are over 30,000 individuals who are 5 years out.
- Suggested annual reporting on the COLA annuity fund with a breakdown of payout from the members' account.

Senator Reagan complimented Ms. Irwin on her testimony and research.

Brian Hawkins, NEA NH

- Supports this bill and the original bill for COLA.
- Since the elimination of the COLA special account 10 years ago there have only been two COLA adjustments.

- The average annual pension is about \$22K.
- Teachers represent 36% of retirees.
- Mr. Hawkins will provide a written request for an amendment.

Arthur Beaudry, NH State Firefighters Retirement Association (NHSFFRA)

- Supports this bill but has reservations.
- The COLA raises were granted by legislature and funded through the general account from 1967-1983.
- In 2007 the funding trigger was changed; \$204 million was retained in the corpus of the fund that would have gone into the special account.
- The elimination of the special account and transfer of \$637million to the corpus of the fund.
- There has been one COLA since July 2010.
- The average annual pension is \$21K.
- Pensions are devoured by inflation and pensioners may have to rely on public services.
- The amendment virtually eliminates group II from receiving a COLA, and they
 do not receive social security
- A \$25K annual pension falls in value by 67% over 20 years.
- NH is an anomaly by not providing COLA.
- Maine offers 2.5% COLA. MA offers an ad hoc COLA based on CPIU. VT has an automatic COLA.
- Please support a COLA for all retirees.

Summary of testimony presented in opposition:

Gerard Fleury, retired from NHRS

- There are significant flaws in this bill.
- Worked for the state for over 35 years and then worked for the City of Manchester.
- This first amendment protected the cities and towns. The original concept to shift the to the state general fund, but then affordability became a problem.
- The amendment allows someone to enter public service and work a short time and walk away with a smaller pension after reaching a certain age.
- As a retiree who made it a career doesn't get COLA this seems unjust.

- The 5 year look back is problematic. The inflation levels in 2021 were far greater.
- Suggested giving every retiree \$50 which will benefit every retiree the same.
- Very frustrated by the bill composition

Neutral Information Presented:

Marty Karlon, NHRS

- NHRS takes no position on this bill and is here to answer any questions.
- Mr. Karlon explained that about 23,000 retirees are eligible for the one-time payment.
- Senator Prentiss asked for clarification that this is a one-time payment.
- Mr. Karlon confirmed that the one-time payment will not add to the base benefit in future years.
