Summary of testimony presented in support:

Representative Michael Vose

Rockingham - District 9

- Introduced HB 289 on behalf of the bill's prime sponsor, Representative Michael Harrington.
- HB 289 expands the definition of an "energy facility" under RSA 162-H:2 to include "an electrical storage facility with a peak storage capacity of 30 megawatt-hours or greater." This change allows the Site Evaluation Committee (SEC) with its additional expertise and resources to have primary jurisdiction on siting large-scale energy storage facilities.
- HB 289 was recommended "ought to pass" by the House Science, Technology, and Energy and was placed on the House consent calendar. The full House adopted the committee's recommendation by a voice vote on the House consent calendar.
- Senator Watters asked if HB 289 would be helpful to Eversource and other electricity suppliers that want to develop energy storage projects. HB 289 may also be timely given the potential for large-scale energy storage as offshore wind development takes off in the Gulf of Maine.
 - o Representative Vose agreed with Senator Watters that HB 289 is a timely measure. HB 289 gives the SEC jurisdiction over the siting of large-scale energy storage facilities.

James Monahan

President, the Dupont Group, representing ReVision Energy and the New England Power Generators Association

• HB 289 is a housekeeping measure. When the SEC statute was established and updated years ago, the concept of large-scale battery storage was not part of the energy industry. However, with recent technological advancements, battery storage is an emerging part of the industry.

• Agreed with Senator Watters that HB 289 is a timely measure. Investors are looking at potential locations to invest capital for energy storage projects. The SEC offers a level of predictability. Passing HB 289 could make NH attractive for energy storage developers and their investors.
