METHODOLOGY:

This bill provides for an extended term of imprisonment for an assault conviction against a member of the United States armed services.

The Department of Corrections cannot predict the number of people that might commit this crime. This makes the fiscal impact to the Department indeterminable. Any fiscal impact would either be no change or an increase in expenditures. The Department has provided the following average cost information.

The Judicial Branch expects the fiscal impact of this bill will be below \$10,000. The Branch assumes, since the bill only addresses the length of the term of imprisonment, the number of prosecutions will not change and the bill would not result in a significant change in its expenditures. The bill would require the Branch to modify and update its Odyssey case management system, to update its forms and notify judges and staff of the changes. The Branch anticipates the additional costs could be managed within existing resources. The collective effort to make these types of changes for all bills that are signed into law takes several months to

implement and may not be possible within the 60 day effective date called for in this bill. If the 60 day effective date remains in place, additional resources, and expenditures, may be necessary to implement the changes in the shorter time frame.

It is assumed that any fiscal impact would occur after July 1,2021.
