STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Thirteen*

AN ACT                   relative to the eligibility of high school students enrolled in college courses to participate in high school extracurricular activities.

*Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:*

1           1 New Subdivision; High School Students Enrolled in College Courses. Amend RSA 189 by  
2 inserting after section 64 the following new subdivision:

3                                   High School Students Enrolled in College Courses

4           189:65 High School Students Enrolled in College Courses. The school board of each school  
5 district shall establish a policy permitting any high school student who has not yet received his or  
6 her diploma and who is taking 50 percent or more of his or her senior year credits at an accredited  
7 postsecondary educational institution to retain his or her status as a high school student and to  
8 permit such student to participate in high school extracurricular activities, prom, and  
9 commencement exercises.

10          2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
