AN ACT establishing a commission to study the current community-based system of commodities reporting by junk or scrap metal dealers in New Hampshire.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

I. There is established a commission to study the current community-based system of commodities reporting by junk or scrap metal dealers in New Hampshire and to examine the advisability of creating a statewide data base to assist in the deterrence or investigation of metal theft in New Hampshire. The members of the commission shall be as follows:

8 9 (a) One member of the senate, appointed by the senate president.

(b) Three members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house.

10 (c) One member, from law enforcement in a community where a scrap metal business
11 resides, appointed by the senate president.

12 (d) One member from the New Hampshire Police Chiefs' Association, appointed by the 13 speaker of the house.

(e) One representative of the scrap metal dealer industry, appointed by the senatepresident.

16 (f) One representative of the scrap metal dealer industry, appointed by the speaker of 17 the house.

18 (g) One member of the construction industry in New Hampshire appointed by the senate19 president.

20 (h) One member of the Auto and Truck Recyclers of New Hampshire, appointed by the21 speaker of the house.

II. The commission shall:

(a) Study the current system of community-based regulation and reporting by junk orscrap metal dealers in New Hampshire.

(b) Study the occurrence of metal theft and arrest records in New Hampshire under thecurrent system.

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(c) Examine what tools exist in New Hampshire currently to curb the incidence of metal

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theft. 1 $\mathbf{2}$ (d) Study effective models in others states and their funding mechanisms. 3 (e) Review and recommend on the advisability of creating a statewide database for 4 New Hampshire, funded by fees on those regulated, and its potential to assist in the deterrence or aid in investigations of metal theft in New Hampshire. $\mathbf{5}$ 6 III. Legislative members of the commission shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when $\overline{7}$ attending to the duties of the commission. 8 IV. Members of the commission shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the commission shall be called by the senate member. The first meeting of the 9 commission shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Five members of the 1011 commission shall constitute a quorum. 12V. The commission shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate 1314clerk, the house clerk, the governor and the state library on or before November 1, 2013. 15101:2 Repeal.
