No liability policy issued or delivered in this state shall contain coverage for payment of a fine or penalty for a criminal offense provided, however, the policy may 4 5 provide coverage for defense costs and restitution to injured parties. 6 IV. An insurer may authorize an advisory organization to file policy forms, endorsements 7 and other contract language on its behalf. 8 [IV.] V. Every insurer and advisory organization shall provide reasonable means whereby 9 any person aggrieved by the application of an insurer's rating system, claims practices, sales 10 practices or underwriting procedures may be heard, in person or by an authorized representative, 11 upon the person's written request to review the manner in which such procedures were applied in 12 connection with insurance afforded or tendered to the person. 13 70:2 Effective Date.
