AN ACT making oral contraceptives available without a prescription.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1	1 New Section; Pharmacies; Oral Contraceptives. Amend RSA 318 by inserting after section 47-i
2	the following new section:
3	318:47-j Pharmacies; Oral Contraceptives.
4	I. Pharmacies, including mail-order pharmacies, may dispense oral contraceptives to persons
5	18 years of age or older without a prescription. Such products shall only be dispensed by pharmacy
6	employees, and shall not be accessible by the public without the assistance of a pharmacy employee.
7	The package shall be labeled as follows: "WARNING: Use of oral contraceptives carries the risk of
8	side effects. Consult your physician before use."
9	II. In this section, "oral contraceptive" means medication taken by mouth for the purpose of
10	birth control such as pills containing estrogen or progesterone.
11	2 Effective Date. This act shall take effect January 1, 2016.
