AN ACT making hormonal contraceptives available directly from pharmacists by means of

a collaborative pharmacy practice agreement.

ANALYSIS

This bill allows pharmacists to dispense hormonal contraceptives pursuant to a collaborative pharmacy practice agreement entered into by heath care providers.

This bill is the result of the commission established pursuant to 2017, 23.

making hormonal contraceptives available directly from pharmacists by means of a collaborative pharmacy practice agreement.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

- 1 Pharmacies; Definitions. Amend RSA 318:1, VI-f to read as follows:
- VI-f. "Hormonal contraceptives" means pills, shots, patches, and rings which the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) classifies as available by prescription for the purpose of contraception or emergency contraception. It does not include similar items classified as "over the counter" by the FDA.
- **VI-g.** "Law enforcement officer" means any officer of the state or political subdivision of the state who is empowered by law to conduct investigations of or to make arrests for offenses enumerated in this chapter.
- 2 New Section; Hormonal Contraceptives; Dispensing. Amend RSA 318 by inserting after section 47-k the following new section:
 - 318:47-1 Hormonal Contraceptives; Dispensing.
- I. In this section, a "collaborative pharmacy practice agreement for contraceptives" means a written and signed agreement entered into voluntarily between one or more pharmacists licensed under RSA 318:18 and one or more physicians licensed under RSA 329:12 or one or more advanced practice registered nurses licensed under RSA 326-B:18. Such agreement shall specify a protocol allowing the pharmacist to dispense hormonal contraceptives under the delegated prescriptive authority of the physician or APRN, specify a mechanism to document screening performed and the prescription in the patient's medical record, and include a plan for evaluating and treating adverse events.
- II. Licensed pharmacists who have an active collaborative pharmacy practice agreement for contraceptives may dispense hormonal contraceptives to persons in this state without a prior prescription. Such products shall only be dispensed by pharmacy employees, and shall not be accessible by the public without the assistance of a pharmacy employee.
- III. A pharmacist or pharmacy shall not employ a physician or APRN for the sole purpose of forming a collaborative pharmacy practice agreement for contraceptives.
- IV. The board shall adopt rules, pursuant to RSA 541-A, relative to administering this section. Rules already adopted regarding collaborative pharmacy agreements shall apply to collaborative practice agreements for contraceptives unless superseded by new rules. Rules shall include an educational requirement for pharmacists prior to entering into a collaborative pharmacy practice agreement for contraceptives.

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- V. Health carriers, as defined in RSA 420-J:3, XXIII, shall ensure reasonable access to medication therapy management services provided by a pharmacist.
- 3 New Paragraph; Pharmacists; Rulemaking. Amend RSA 318:5-a by inserting after paragraph
 4 XVIII the following new paragraph:
- 5 XIX. Dispensing hormonal contraceptives in accordance with RSA 318:47-1.
- 6 4 Effective Date. This act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.
