

Amendment to HB 2-FN-A-LOCAL

1 Amend the bill by replacing all after the enacting clause with the following:

2

3 1 Repeal. 2017, 155:7 relative to budget adjustments and class 027 transfers to the department  
4 of information technology for fiscal year 2019, is repealed.

5 2 Department of Administrative Services; Debarment of Vendors. Amend the introductory  
6 paragraph of RSA 21-I:11-c, I to read as follows:

7 I.(a) No individual or business entity shall [~~make a bid, proposal, or quotation in response~~  
8 ~~to a request for~~] **be awarded a** bid, proposal, or quotation issued by the division of procurement  
9 and support services if that individual or entity, or any of its subsidiaries, affiliates, or principal  
10 officers:

11 3 Department of Administrative Services; Debarment of Vendors; Statement. Amend RSA 21-  
12 I:11-c, I(b) to read as follows:

13 (b) All individuals or business entities submitting a bid, proposal, or quotation in  
14 response to a request for a bid, proposal, or quotation issued by the division of procurement and  
15 support services shall, as part of their response, provide [~~an affidavit signed under oath before a~~  
16 ~~duly authorized notary public~~] **a statement signed under penalty of unsworn falsification as**  
17 **set forth in RSA 641:3** that all conditions listed in subparagraphs (a)(1)-(10) have been met.  
18 Failure to submit such [~~an affidavit or, should the affidavit be false or signed~~] **a statement, the**  
19 **filing of a false statement, or the signing of the statement** by an unauthorized person, **shall**  
20 **be reason for** the bid, proposal, or quotation [~~shall~~] **to be** [~~automatically~~] rejected and the resulting  
21 contract, if any, shall be deemed to be in breach. The commissioner of the department of  
22 administrative services shall adopt rules under RSA 541-A relative to the [~~affidavit~~] **statement**  
23 required under this subparagraph.

24 4 Department of Administrative Services; Divisions. Amend the section heading of RSA 21-I:11  
25 to read as follows:

26 21-I:11 [~~Division~~] **Divisions of Procurement and Support Services, Public Works Design**  
27 **and Construction, and** Plant and Property [~~Management~~].

28 5 Department of Administrative Services; Director of Plant and Property. Amend the  
29 introductory paragraph of RSA 21-I:11, I(c) to read as follows:

30 (c) The division of plant and property, which shall be under the supervision of [~~a~~  
31 ~~classified administrator who~~] **an unclassified director of plant and property who shall be**  
32 **qualified to hold that position by reason of education and experience and shall perform**

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1 *such duties as the commissioner from time to time may authorize. The director of plant*  
2 *and property* shall be responsible for the following functions, in accordance with applicable law:

3 6 Director of Plant and Property; Salary; Funding; Effective Date.

4 I. The salary of the director of plant and property shall be determined after assessment and  
5 review of the appropriate temporary letter grade allocation in RSA 94:1-a, I(b) for the position  
6 which shall be conducted pursuant to RSA 94:1-d and RSA 14:14-c. Upon completion of this action  
7 and appointment of the director of plant and property, position number 10082 shall be abolished to  
8 allow for the transition of this classified position with its available appropriations into the  
9 unclassified position of director of plant and property. Funding shall be transferred into a new  
10 expenditure class number 11, within accounting unit 01-14-14-141510-1440. The incumbent in the  
11 abolished classified position shall be offered the opportunity to seek the commissioner's nomination  
12 for the unclassified position of director of plant and property.

13 II. The amendment to RSA 21-I:11, I(c) by section 5 of this act shall take effect upon the  
14 abolition of position number 10082 under paragraph I, as certified by the commissioner of  
15 administrative services to the secretary of state and the director of legislative services.

16 7 Department of Administrative Services; Directors; Officers. Amend RSA 21-I:2, II to read as  
17 follows:

18 II. The commissioner shall nominate for appointment by the governor, with the consent of  
19 the council, each unclassified division director, the assistant commissioner, the deputy  
20 commissioner, the internal auditor, the *director of* financial data [~~manager~~] *management*, the  
21 [~~manager~~] *director* of [~~risks~~] *risk* and benefits, and the senior operational analyst. The  
22 unclassified division directors, the assistant commissioner, the deputy commissioner, the internal  
23 auditor, the *director of* financial data [~~manager~~] *management*, the [~~manager~~] *director* of [~~risks~~]  
24 *risk* and benefits, and the senior operational analyst shall each serve for a term of 4 years.

25 8 Department of Administrative Services; Office of the Commissioner. RSA 21-I:4 is repealed  
26 and reenacted to read as follows:

27 21-I:4 Office Established. There is hereby established an office of the commissioner consisting  
28 of the following units:

29 I. State budget.

30 II. Internal audit.

31 III. Operational analysis.

32 IV. Cost containment.

33 9 Division of Financial Data Management. Amend RSA 21-I:5 to read as follows:

34 21-I:5 *Division of* Financial Data Management [~~Unit~~]. There is hereby established within the  
35 [~~office of the commissioner~~] *department a division of* financial data management [~~unit~~] under the  
36 supervision of an unclassified *director of* financial data [~~manager~~] *management* who shall be  
37 responsible for the following functions in accordance with applicable laws:

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1 I. Providing coordination of all internal department financial information in order to assure  
2 the compatibility, continuity and integrity of such information.

3 II. Assisting the commissioner with the planning, management and operation of all internal  
4 department financial information systems.

5 III. Carrying on a continuing analytical research and planning program in the field of  
6 governmental financial management in order to provide for the most effective and efficient  
7 information management systems possible.

8 IV. Accomplishing data entry and control of information for all internal department  
9 financial systems, and preparing and distributing reports generated from those systems.

10 V. Assisting department division directors by:

11 (a) Establishing and operating a financial information resource center for their use.

12 (b) Jointly monitoring state and federal fiscal legislation with the directors in order to  
13 assure timely awareness of and compliance with new legislation.

14 VI. Assisting users of information and financial systems which are the responsibility of the  
15 **division of** financial data management [~~unit~~].

16 10 Department of Administrative Services; Division of Risk and Benefits. Amend RSA 21-I:7-c  
17 to read as follows:

18 21-I:7-c Risk [~~Management~~] **and Benefits**. There is established within the [~~office of the~~  
19 ~~commissioner of administrative services a~~] **department a division of** risk [~~management unit~~] **and**  
20 **benefits**, under the supervision of an unclassified [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and benefits,  
21 who shall be qualified to hold that position by reason of education and experience, and who shall  
22 perform such duties as the commissioner from time to time may authorize. The functions of the  
23 **division of** risk [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** shall be divided across the following bureaus:

24 I. The bureau of health and benefits, under the supervision of a classified administrator,  
25 who shall be responsible for the following functions, in accordance with applicable law:

26 (a) Overseeing and administering the state employee and retiree group insurance  
27 programs authorized by RSA 21-I:26 through RSA 21-I:36, in accordance with administrative rules  
28 adopted pursuant to RSA 21-I:14, XIII.

29 (b) Coordinating the employee and retiree benefit programs administered through the  
30 **division of** risk [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** with the benefits and programs offered through  
31 the New Hampshire retirement system and the state's deferred compensation commission  
32 established in RSA 101-B.

33 (c) Overseeing and administering all additional employee or retiree benefit programs  
34 offered by the state, other than those related to the New Hampshire retirement system or the  
35 state's deferred compensation commission established in RSA 101-B.

36 (d) Conducting ongoing studies of alternative financing methods and benefit offerings.

37 (e) To the extent deemed necessary by the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and

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1 benefits, creating for potential incorporation into the department of administrative services manual  
2 of procedures described at RSA 21-I:14, I(b), a technical assistance manual that clearly explains  
3 procedures related to the bureau's functions, including but not limited to procedures relating to  
4 employee and retiree benefits.

5 (f) Developing and monitoring insurance and third party administrator contracts  
6 related to the state employee and retiree group insurance program in accordance with applicable  
7 law, by:

8 (1) Developing bid specifications for insurance and third party administrator  
9 contracts and ensuring bid specifications are in compliance with applicable collective bargaining  
10 agreements.

11 (2) Negotiating final contract terms with the vendors awarded contracts through  
12 the procurement process.

13 (3) Formalizing contract agreements.

14 (4) Monitoring contracts on an ongoing basis to ensure timely procurement,  
15 renewals, amendments, updates, statutory compliance, and extensions.

16 (5) Ensuring that vendors comply with the requirements of contract agreements by:

17 (A) Implementing, monitoring, and enforcing performance guarantees.

18 (B) Receiving and analyzing state employee and retiree group insurance  
19 utilization data and statistics.

20 (C) Monitoring Medicare issues to ensure compliance with federal law and  
21 programs.

22 (g) Reviewing and making recommendations to the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk**  
23 and benefits that are intended to ensure the proper operation and long term sustainability of the  
24 bureau's programs.

25 (h) Implementing, overseeing, and administering employee wellness initiatives.

26 (i) Advising the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and benefits and, upon request, the  
27 commissioner, the governor and executive council, the general court, the state retiree health plan  
28 commission established in RSA 100-A:56, the joint legislative fiscal committee established in RSA  
29 14:30-a, and other entities regarding employee and retiree benefits program.

30 (j) Ensuring that the bureau's programs are compliant with applicable state and federal  
31 law.

32 (k) Monitoring agencies' activities for compliance with benefit program requirements.

33 II. The bureau of property, casualty, and workers' compensation, under the supervision of a  
34 classified administrator, who shall be responsible for the following functions, in accordance with  
35 applicable law:

36 (a) Overseeing and administering the state's workers' compensation program under  
37 RSA 21-I:24 and RSA 21-I:25-a or other applicable law.

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1 (b) Identifying loss exposure for all state real and personal property and for personal  
2 injury, except as otherwise provided by law, on a continuing basis.

3 (c) Identifying cost-effective means for protecting against various types of losses,  
4 including self-funding, commercial insurance purchases, and risk assumption, and recommending  
5 to the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and benefits actions to be taken through the budget  
6 process, or other processes, to implement such means.

7 (d) After consultation with, and approval by the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and  
8 benefits, purchasing liability insurance under a fleet policy covering the operation of state-owned  
9 vehicles and motorboats, and such other insurance and surety bonds as any state department,  
10 agency, or official may be legally authorized to secure, or required to furnish; provided that  
11 approval shall not be granted for any such insurance or surety bonds unless the same have been  
12 marketed and procured through a resident agent of an insurance company registered and licensed  
13 to do business in this state. With the exception of any risk located outside the state, no such  
14 insurance company or resident agent, personally or by another, shall allow, give, or pay, directly or  
15 indirectly, to any nonresident agent or nonresident broker any part of the commission on the sale of  
16 such insurance or surety bonds. The insurance commissioner may suspend or revoke the license of  
17 any resident agent or insurance company violating the provisions hereof.

18 (e) Conducting ongoing studies of alternative financing methods and benefit offerings.

19 (f) Overseeing the state employee workers' compensation and commercial insurance  
20 programs, by:

21 (1) Preparing bid specifications for commercial insurance and third party  
22 administrator contracts related to workers' compensation and commercial insurance in accordance  
23 with applicable law, and ensuring bid specifications are in compliance with collective bargaining  
24 agreements.

25 (2) Negotiating final contract terms with the vendors awarded contracts through  
26 the procurement process, formalizing contract agreements, and monitoring contracts on an ongoing  
27 basis to ensure timely procurement, renewals, amendments, updates, statutory compliance, and  
28 extensions.

29 (3) Managing claims payments and statistical data related to workers' compensation  
30 and commercial insurance and ensuring vendors comply with the requirements of contract  
31 agreements.

32 (4) Coordinating and developing processes and procedures related to the workers'  
33 compensation and commercial insurance programs.

34 (5) Monitoring agencies' workers' compensation and commercial insurance activities  
35 for compliance with requirements.

36 (g) To the extent deemed necessary by the [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and  
37 benefits, creating for potential incorporation into the department of administrative services manual

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1 of procedures described at RSA 21-I:14, I(b), a technical assistance manual or manuals that clearly  
2 explains procedures related to the bureau's functions.

3 (h) Evaluating risks facing the state and developing and operating health, safety, loss  
4 control, and risk reduction programs, in accordance with loss prevention guidelines adopted  
5 pursuant to RSA 21-I:14, II.

6 (i) Reviewing and making recommendations to the ~~[manager of risks]~~ **director of risk**  
7 and benefits that are intended to ensure the proper operation and long term sustainability of the  
8 bureau's programs.

9 (j) Advising the ~~[manager of risks]~~ **director of risk** and benefits and, upon request, the  
10 commissioner, the governor and executive council, the general court, and other entities regarding  
11 the bureau's programs.

12 (k) Ensuring that the bureau's programs are compliant with applicable state and  
13 federal law.

14 III. The bureau of finance, under the supervision of a classified administrator, who shall be  
15 responsible for the following functions, in accordance with applicable law:

16 (a) Managing claims payments, vendor payments, statistical data, and financial  
17 reporting related to the risk management unit's responsibilities.

18 (b) Conducting ongoing studies of alternative financing methods and benefit offerings.

19 (c) To the extent deemed necessary by the ~~[manager of risks]~~ **director of risk** and  
20 benefits, creating for potential incorporation into the department of administrative services manual  
21 of procedures described at RSA 21-I:14, I(b), a technical assistance manual that clearly explains  
22 procedures related to the bureau's functions.

23 (d) Establishing working rate tables for application to self-insured health benefit  
24 programs, including by coordinating and reviewing actuarial projections, considering rate  
25 alternatives and modeling, and developing full working rate tables.

26 (e) Reviewing and making recommendations to the ~~[manager of risks]~~ **director of risk**  
27 and benefits that are intended to ensure the proper operation and long term sustainability of the  
28 bureau's programs.

29 (f) Advising the ~~[manager of risks]~~ **director of risk** and benefits and, upon request, the  
30 commissioner, the governor and executive council, the general court, and other entities regarding  
31 the bureau's programs.

32 (g) Ensuring that the bureau's programs are compliant with applicable state and  
33 federal law.

34 (h) Monitoring agencies' financial activities for compliance with financial requirements  
35 of the state's health benefit program.

36 11 Department of Administrative Services; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 21-I:24, I to read  
37 as follows:

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1 I. The commissioner of administrative services, through the department's *division of* risk  
2 [~~management unit~~] *and benefits*, is hereby authorized to pay such sum or sums as may be awarded  
3 under the provisions of RSA 281-A, and the expense of insurance and third party administrator  
4 services providing managed care programs authorized by RSA 281-A:23-a and similar services  
5 directly related to the provision and monitoring of workers' compensation benefits payable to state  
6 employees.

7 12 Department of Administrative Services; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 21-I:25-a, to read  
8 as follows:

9 21-I:25-a Procurement of Managed Care and Other Risk-Shifting Services. By following the  
10 procedures of RSA 21-I:28, the commissioner of administrative services, through the department's  
11 *division of* risk [~~management unit~~] *and benefits*, and after consultation with the governor and  
12 council, may contract for or purchase insurance or third party administrator services providing  
13 managed care program services and similar services directly related to the provision and  
14 monitoring of workers' compensation benefits payable to state employees.

15 13 Department of Administrative Services; References Changed. Amend RSA 21-I:30-f to read  
16 as follows:

17 21-I:30-f Administrative Cost of Certain Programs Administered by the *Division of* Risk  
18 [~~Management Unit~~] *and Benefits*; Obligation of Employee. The *division of* risk [~~management~~  
19 ~~unit~~] *and benefits* may use moneys in the employee benefit adjustment account, established under  
20 RSA 9:17-c, for the purposes of paying the administrative fees for the dependent care assistance  
21 program established under RSA 21-I:44-a and the medical and related expenses program  
22 established under RSA 21-I:44-b. The *division of* risk [~~management unit~~] *and benefits* may also  
23 use such moneys in the event money must be paid to the contracting party in advance to cover the  
24 employee's medical expenses, when the employee has not contributed all of such costs from payroll  
25 deductions, provided that the employee benefit adjustment account shall be repaid when the  
26 employee fulfills his or her obligation.

27 14 Department of Administrative Services; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 21-I:44-a, to read  
28 as follows:

29 21-I:44-a Dependent Care Assistance Program Established. There is established a dependent  
30 care assistance program to be administered by the *division of* risk [~~management unit~~] *and*  
31 *benefits* of the department of administrative services with the assistance of the division of  
32 accounting services of the department of administrative services and the treasury department.  
33 Under this program, an employee may have a certain amount of his or her salary withheld, before  
34 taxes, for the purpose of day care expenses.

35 15 Department of Administrative Services; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 21-I:44-b, to read  
36 as follows:

37 21-I:44-b Medical and Related Expenses Program Established. There is established a medical

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1 related expenses program to be administered by the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and**  
2 **benefits** of the department of administrative services with the assistance of the division of  
3 accounting services of the department of administrative services and the treasury department.  
4 Under this program, an employee may have a certain amount of his or her salary withheld, before  
5 taxes, for the purpose of medical expenses.

6 16 State Agency Insurance; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 9:27 to read as follows:

7 9:27 Insurance.

8 [~~I.~~] Any agency or department of the state may, with the approval of the governor and  
9 council and within the limits of its appropriation, secure casualty or liability insurance on any  
10 property owned by the state or in connection with any program or activity of the state; provided,  
11 however, that all such purchases shall first be reviewed and approved by the **division of risk**  
12 [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** of the department of administrative services and that any  
13 insurance specifically required by law shall be carried.

14 [~~II. All casualty or liability insurance secured by an agency or department and in effect on~~  
15 ~~July 1, 2017, shall be reported to the risk management unit by September 1, 2017.]~~

16 17 Health and Human Services; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 161:4, III to read as follows:

17 III. Liability Insurance. The commissioner of the department of health and human services  
18 or designee shall have the authority, after consultation with the insurance department and the  
19 **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and benefits**, and in accordance with the procedures  
20 established by the commissioner of administrative services under RSA 21-I:7-c, V, to purchase  
21 personal liability coverage for individuals providing care to adults receiving assistance from the  
22 department of health and human services who reside in certified residential care facilities. The  
23 amount and nature of this insurance coverage may vary in the discretion of the commissioner of  
24 administrative services.

25 18 Services for Youth and Families; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 170-G:3, VI to read as  
26 follows:

27 VI. The commissioner shall have authority, after consultation with the insurance  
28 department and the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and benefits**, and in accordance with the  
29 procedures established by the commissioner of administrative services under RSA 21-I:7-c, V, to  
30 purchase insurance coverage for the benefit of individuals providing foster care to children within  
31 the jurisdiction of the department. The amount and nature of this insurance coverage may vary in  
32 the discretion of the commissioner of administrative services.

33 19 Services for Youth and Families; References Changed. Amend RSA 170-G:3, VII(b) and (c)  
34 to read as follows:

35 (b) No payment shall be made under subparagraph (a)(1) or (2) unless the department  
36 investigates the claim and the commissioner, or the commissioner's designee, recommends to the  
37 **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** that the claim, or some portion of the claim, be



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1 paid. If the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** determines that the claim meets the  
2 requirements of this paragraph and is reasonable in amount, the commissioner of administrative  
3 services, or the commissioner's designee, shall authorize such payment.

4 (c) No payment shall be made under subparagraph (a)(3) unless the department  
5 investigates the claim and the commissioner, or the commissioner's designee determines the foster  
6 parent did not act intentionally, willfully or recklessly, and recommends to the **division of risk**  
7 [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** that the claim, or some portion of the claim, be paid. If the  
8 **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** determines that the claim meets the  
9 requirements of this subparagraph, the attorney general shall be notified and shall select a  
10 qualified attorney to provide legal representation and defense to the claimant subject to the dollar  
11 limitations of subparagraph (a)(3), the recommendations of the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~]  
12 **and benefits**, and the attorney general's own experience and expertise. The commissioner of  
13 administrative services, or the commissioner's designee, shall authorize payment of such amounts  
14 as are approved by the attorney general.

15 20 University System; References Changed. Amend RSA 187-A:43, VI-VII, to read as follows:

16 VI. Cost analysis, including costs associated with the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~]  
17 **and benefits** staff, shall be paid for by the university system. The university system shall pay all  
18 associated costs of transferring data into the state group health insurance plan and all costs  
19 associated with data collection, data manipulation associated with transferring from one plan to  
20 another, and costs of university system changes, including staff costs.

21 VII. The university system shall provide to the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~] **and**  
22 **benefits** a file of medical and pharmaceutical claims for the previous 2 years which shall not  
23 contain any personally identifiable information.

24 21 Community College System; References Changed. Amend RSA 188-F:68, VI-VII, to read as  
25 follows:

26 VI. Cost analysis, including costs associated with the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~]  
27 **and benefits** staff, shall be paid for by the community college system. The community college  
28 system shall pay all associated costs of transferring data into the state group health insurance plan  
29 and all costs associated with data collection, data manipulation associated with transferring from  
30 one plan to another, and costs of system changes, including staff costs.

31 VII. The community college system shall provide to the **division of risk** [~~management unit~~]  
32 **and benefits** a file of medical and pharmaceutical claims for the previous 2 years which shall not  
33 contain any personally identifiable information.

34 22 Board of Claims; Reference Changed. Amend RSA 541-B:11-A to read as follows:

35 541-B:11-a Annual Report. The secretary of state shall provide annually to the **division of risk**  
36 [~~management unit~~] **and benefits** a copy of the annual report for the board.

37 23 Salaries; Unclassified State Officers. Amend the following positions in RSA 94:1-a, I(b),

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1 salary grade HH, to read as follows:

2 HH Department of administrative services [~~manager of risks~~] **director of risk** and benefits

3 HH Department of administrative services **director of** financial data [~~manager~~] **management**

4 24 Department of Administrative Services; Intent of Amendment of Risk Management Unit;  
5 Continuation of Operations. The amendment to the title of the risk management unit to the  
6 division of risk and benefits is not intended to alter the underlying functions, authorities, or  
7 personnel of the existing unit or its manager, or the compensation of any existing employee. The  
8 division of risk and benefits shall perform all duties previously performed by the risk management  
9 unit and the director of the division of risk and benefits shall perform all duties and functions  
10 previously performed by the manager of risks. Any and all documents entered into by the risk  
11 management unit or any of its subunits, including but not limited to contracts, agreements,  
12 requests for proposals, requests for bids, requests for quotes, purchase orders, and other items shall  
13 be construed to apply to, and shall be deemed to be the action of, the division of risk and benefits.

14 25 Department of Administrative Services; Intent of Amendment of Title of the Manager of  
15 Risks; Continuation of Salary and Functions. The unclassified employee serving as the manager of  
16 risks prior to the effective date of this section shall, barring resignation or removal from office, be  
17 deemed the director of the division of risk and benefits for the remainder of his or her existing term  
18 as the manager of risks and benefits. The salary of the director of the division of risk and benefits  
19 shall be that allocated in RSA 94:1-a, I(b) to the manager of risks and benefits.

20 26 Department of Administrative Services; Continuation of Laws; Transfer of Duties Relating  
21 to Risk Management. All provisions of law that remain in effect and refer to the department of  
22 administrative services' risk management unit shall be construed so as to apply to the division of  
23 risk and benefits. All powers, duties, and obligations of the risk management unit, and all bureaus  
24 or other subunits within the unit, shall be transferred to the division of risk and benefits and its  
25 subunits without interruption or delay on the effective date of this section. The transfer shall  
26 include, but not be limited to, all personnel, equipment, and funding of the former risk management  
27 unit and its subunits. The department of administrative services may make such changes to the  
28 accounting structure and budgetary allocations for the biennium ending June 30, 2021 as it  
29 concludes are necessary or appropriate to effectuate and accommodate the changes made to the  
30 department by this act.

31 27 Department of Administrative Services; Intent of Amendment of Financial Data  
32 Management Unit; Continuation of Operations. The alteration of the title of the financial data  
33 management unit to the division of financial data management is not intended to alter the  
34 underlying functions, authorities, or personnel of the existing unit or its manager, or the  
35 compensation of any existing employee. The division of financial data management shall perform  
36 all duties previously performed by the financial data management unit and the director of the  
37 division of financial data management shall perform all duties and function previously performed

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1 by the financial data manager. Any and all documents entered into by the financial data  
2 management unit or any of its subunits, including but not limited to contracts, agreements,  
3 requests for proposals, requests for bids, requests for quotes, purchase orders, and other items shall  
4 be construed to apply to, and be deemed to be the action of, the division of financial data  
5 management.

6 28 Department of Administrative Services; Intent of Amendment of Title of the Financial Data  
7 Manager; Continuation of Salary and Functions. The unclassified employee serving as the financial  
8 data manager as of the effective date of this section shall, barring resignation or removal from  
9 office, be deemed the director of the division of financial data management for the remainder of his  
10 or her existing term as the financial data manager. The salary of the director of the division of  
11 financial data management shall be that allocated in RSA 94:1-a, I(b) to the financial data manager.

12 29 Department of Administrative Services; Continuation of Laws; Transfer of Duties Relating  
13 to Financial Data Management. All provisions of law that remain in effect and refer to the  
14 department of administrative services' financial data management unit shall be construed so as to  
15 apply to the division of financial data management. All powers, duties, and obligations of the  
16 financial data management unit, and all bureaus or other subunits within the unit, shall be  
17 transferred to the division of financial data management and its subunits without interruption or  
18 delay on the effective date of this section. The transfer shall include, but not be limited to, all  
19 personnel, equipment, and funding of the former financial data management unit and its subunits.  
20 The department of administrative services may make such changes to the accounting structure and  
21 budgetary allocations for the biennium ending June 30, 2021 as it concludes are necessary or  
22 appropriate to effectuate and accommodate the changes made to the department by this act.

23 30 Department of Administrative Services; Consolidation of Human Resources and Payroll  
24 Functions.

25 I. Notwithstanding any law or administrative rule to the contrary, the commissioner of  
26 administrative services, with the prior approval of the fiscal committee of the general court and the  
27 governor and council, may make such transfers of appropriation items and changes in allocations of  
28 funds available for operational purposes to the department of administrative services from any  
29 other agency necessary to effectuate the efficient consolidation or deconsolidation of human  
30 resources, payroll and business processing functions within state government. Such business  
31 processing functions shall include:

32 (a) Accounts receivable;

33 (b) Accounts payable;

34 (c) Collection of fines, penalties, fees, restitution, remittances, and other moneys due to  
35 the state; and

36 (d) Such additional finance, accounting and other functions and transactions that the  
37 commissioner of administrative services determines may potentially achieve substantial efficiencies

1 from consolidation.

2           II. The commissioner of administrative services may establish the number of total  
3 personnel required for human resources, payroll, and business processing functions in the executive  
4 branch of state government and, with the prior approval of the governor and council, may eliminate  
5 unnecessary positions and may transfer positions to or from the department of administrative  
6 services to or from any other agency if the commissioner of administrative services concludes that  
7 such transfers or eliminations are necessary to effectuate the efficient consolidation or  
8 deconsolidation of human resources, payroll, or business processing functions within state  
9 government. Such transfers may, if deemed appropriate by the commissioner of administrative  
10 services, include the transfer of all associated books, papers, records, personnel files, and  
11 equipment, including, but not limited to, work station and information technology equipment, and  
12 may, if deemed appropriate by the commissioner of administrative services, include the transfer of  
13 any unexpended appropriations for any of the foregoing, and any unexpended appropriations for  
14 salary, payroll, benefits, support costs, or any other costs associated with the transferred personnel.  
15 The department of administrative services may also establish new full-time temporary positions  
16 within the department, if the commissioner of administrative services deems it necessary to  
17 effectuate the efficient consolidation or deconsolidation of human resources, payroll, or business  
18 processing functions.

19           III. The commissioner of administrative services may locate personnel whose positions have  
20 been transferred in such work spaces as the commissioner determines will efficiently effectuate the  
21 consolidation or deconsolidation of functions. Such work spaces may include either space currently  
22 owned or rented by the state, or space which may be rented by the commissioner utilizing amounts  
23 which may be saved by the state as the result of the consolidation or deconsolidation of functions.

24           IV. If the commissioner of administrative services consolidates, deconsolidates or, pursuant  
25 to 2015, 276:2 or other law, has consolidated or deconsolidated, any human resources, payroll, or  
26 business processing function and subsequently determines that such consolidation or  
27 deconsolidation is not cost effective or beneficial to the interests of the state, the commissioner may,  
28 with the prior approval of the fiscal committee of the general court, deconsolidate or reconsolidate,  
29 fully or partially, any human resources, payroll, or business processing function within the  
30 executive branch of state government. As part of a deconsolidation, the commissioner, after  
31 consultation with the heads of such executive branch agencies as may be affected, shall determine  
32 positions to be transferred to another agency, shall determine positions to be transferred elsewhere  
33 within the department of administrative services, or shall determine positions to be eliminated.

34           V. Any unspent balance remaining of the \$250,000 appropriation made by 2011, 224:86 to  
35 the department of administrative services for the biennium ending June 30, 2013, for the purpose of  
36 selecting and retaining an independent business processing consultant to evaluate and make  
37 recommendations relative to the consolidation of business processing functions within state

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1 government, shall not lapse until June 30, 2021. The department of administrative services may  
2 use this balance to fund such projects, functions, or activities as the commissioner of administrative  
3 services may direct relating to the efficiency of state government, including, but not limited to, the  
4 selection and retention of an independent business processing consultant and/or other projects,  
5 functions, or activities relating to the consolidation or deconsolidation of human resource, payroll  
6 and business processing functions.

7 31 Department of Administrative Services; State Employee Health Plan; Application. The cost  
8 sharing and plan design for unrepresented active state employees who participate in the health  
9 plans offered by the state shall be the same as those for individuals covered by the collective  
10 bargaining agreement between the state of New Hampshire and the State Employees' Association of  
11 New Hampshire, Inc. The fiscal committee of the general court may approve changes to the above  
12 plan design cost sharing provisions consistent with RSA 21-I:30, I. The cost sharing and plan  
13 designs for represented active state employees who participate in the health plans offered by the  
14 state shall be in accordance with the provisions of the collective bargaining agreements between the  
15 state and the employee organizations representing those employees.

16 32 Department of Administrative Services; Health Coverage Shared Responsibility. Agencies  
17 may use funds in existing class 60 budgets to pay any penalties imposed under the employer shared  
18 responsibility for health coverage under section 4980H of the Internal Revenue Code.

19 33 All Agencies; Administrative Services; Electronic Mail. Unless restricted by law or  
20 administrative rule, upon request of an intended recipient, an agency may provide documents by  
21 electronic mailing in lieu of mail.

22 34 Department of Administrative Services; Heating Systems Savings. Amend RSA 21-I:19-ff to  
23 read as follows:

24 21-I:19-ff State Heating System Savings Account. There is hereby established the state heating  
25 system savings account for the transfer of unexpended state heating system appropriations due to  
26 reduced heating system costs resulting from the 26 state buildings served by the Concord Steam  
27 project authorized in 2017, 2. Notwithstanding RSA 21-I:19-e, at the end of each state fiscal year,  
28 the commissioner of administrative services shall identify the unexpended appropriations in the

37 35 State Heating System Facilities. Any unspent balance remaining on the \$18,000,000

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1 appropriation made by 2017, 2 to the department of administrative services for the fiscal year  
2 ending June 30, 2017, for the purpose of the purchase and replacement of all systems providing  
3 heat to state facilities located at the Governor Hugh J. Gallen state office park and state-owned  
4 buildings in downtown Concord that were obtaining steam from Concord Steam corporation, as well  
5 as the decommissioning of the steam plant located at 105 Pleasant Street in Concord, including but  
6 not limited to system design, construction, hazardous material remediation, and project  
7 administration and management, as required, shall not lapse until June 30, 2020. As indicated in  
8 2017, 2, this project shall be managed by the division of public works design and construction and  
9 funds may be expended to fund any temporary personnel for the purpose of project administration,  
10 management, or clerk of the works. The commissioner of the department of administrative services  
11 is also authorized to employ a classified, full-time, permanent project manager in the division of  
12 public works design and construction, whose initial salary and benefit cost shall be from funds  
13 appropriated pursuant to 2017, 2. The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of  
14 any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, and said funds shall not lapse until June 30,  
15 2020.

16 36 Department of Administrative Services; Funding and Staffing Resource Limitations.

17 I. Due to inadequate funding and staffing resources at the department of administrative  
18 services, the commissioner of the department of administrative services may suspend the  
19 obligations or requirements under RSA 21-I:7-c as it applies to addressing performance and  
20 financial legislative budget assistant audit findings from 2006, 2011, and 2014 regarding  
21 management of the employee and retiree health benefit program, including establishing rules and

31 gas emissions in compliance with governor's executive order 2016-03.

32 37 Department of Administrative Services; Establishment of Additional Surplus Fund. Amend  
33 RSA 21-I:11, I, (a)(6)(B) to read as follows:

34 (B) Be maintained by the treasurer ~~[as a]~~ ***in one of 2*** separate, restricted ~~[fund]~~  
35 ***funds:***

36 (i) ***The surplus distribution section administrative assessments fund,***  
37 ***into which shall be deposited funds received by the department by virtue of the disposition***

36 section shall not exceed the state appropriation for leased space. If the amount appropriated is  
37 insufficient therefor, the appropriation shall be prorated proportionally among the schools eligible

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1 for a grant. Such lease agreements shall be eligible for grants under this section, provided all of the  
2 following conditions apply:

3 55 Meals and Rooms Tax; Distribution to Cities and Towns. For the fiscal years ending June

14 63 Department of Health and Human Services; Public Safety and Welfare; Medicaid  
15 Enhancement for Children and Pregnant Women. If the New Hampshire granite advantage health  
16 care program established under RSA 126-AA is repealed effective December 31, 2023 or earlier, the  
17 commissioner of the department of health and human services shall reinstate Medicaid coverage  
18 and open enrollment for children and pregnant women under RSA 167:68. The commissioner of the  
19 department of health and human services shall adopt rules, pursuant to RSA 541-A, to establish the  
20 eligibility levels for Medicaid coverage under RSA 167:68 identical to the eligibility levels which

27 I. There is hereby established the developmental services fund. The fund, from

29 provisions of this chapter. The fund shall be nonlapsing and shall be continually appropriated to  
30 the commissioner for the purposes of this chapter.

31 II. There is hereby established the acquired brain disorder services fund. The fund, from  
32 appropriations provided in accounting unit 05-95-93-930010-7016, shall be used to carry out the  
33 provisions of this chapter. The fund shall be nonlapsing and shall be continually appropriated to

13 73 Department of Health and Human Services; Transfer of Certain Trust Funds.

14 I. The trust established in *In Re: Laconia State School Trust Funds*, Docket Number 317-  
15 2017-EQ-599 (6th Circuit-Probate Division-Concord) shall be dissolved upon the final distribution of  
16 funds pursuant to the court order issued in that case.

17 II. Distributions shall be made from the trust to former residents of Laconia state school  
18 pursuant to court order. When there are no longer any surviving former residents of Laconia state  
19 school, any funds remaining in the trust shall be distributed to persons receiving services from the  
20 state developmental services system, in accordance with the court order, until all of the funds in the

4           (b) Attendance records and the level of difficulty in achieving quorum for meetings.  
5           (c) Whether there is duplication of purpose or activities.  
6           (d) Any other factors which the committee deems relevant.

7           V. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for legislation,  
8 including recommendations for repeal of non-regulatory boards, commissions, councils, or other  
9 advisory bodies to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the  
10 senate clerk, the house clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2019.

11           75 Department of Health and Human Services; Plan to Close the Cliff Effect for Individuals  
12 and Families who Receive Public Benefits.

13           I. The purpose of this section is to coordinate poverty reduction strategies across agencies  
14 and employers to provide necessary support mechanisms to ensure the long-term success for New  
15 Hampshire's families and children for economic independence achieved through employment, and to  
16 demonstrate successful outcomes for families and children for identifying supportive transitions  
17 from public benefits to self-sufficiency while enhancing New Hampshire's workforce. Families  
18 include parents, grandparents, caretaker relatives, and other individuals caring for children  
19 acknowledging that the opioid crisis has impacted the care of New Hampshire's children.

20           II. In this section, "cliff effect" means the experience of individuals or families who receive  
21 public benefits when new or increased income results in a reduction or loss of public benefits, but  
22 the increased income does not fully compensate for or exceed the loss of public benefits. This results  
23 in the individual and or family with less public benefits and an increase in out-of-pocket expenses  
24 that eliminates any financial gain from the new or increased income.

25           III. The department of health and human services shall develop a plan to close the cliff  
26 effect so New Hampshire individuals and families are afforded a full opportunity to participate in  
27 the New Hampshire workforce. The plan shall include the development and implementation of a  
28 "benefits cliff calculator" to measure the effect of increased income for individuals or families who  
29 receive public benefits and shall include related policy options such as, but not limited to, an earned  
30 income disregard, transportation accessibility, and incentives for employment retention based on an  
31 updated economic analysis.

32           IV. No later than 30 days after the effective date of this section, the commissioner of the  
33 department of health and human services shall convene a working group consisting, at a minimum  
34 of, representatives of the following departments or agencies: the commissioner of the department of  
35 employment security or designee, the commissioner of the department of education or designee, the  
36 commissioner of the department of business and economic affairs or designee, the chancellor of the  
37 community college system of New Hampshire or designee, the executive director of the New

1 Hampshire housing finance authority or designee, a representative of a philanthropic agency  
2 appointed by the governor, a representative from a community action program appointed by the  
3 governor, a private employer appointed by the governor, an individual who is receiving or who has  
4 received public benefits appointed by the governor, a member of the house of representatives  
5 appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives, and a member of the senate appointed by  
6 the senate president.

7 V. The meetings of the working group shall be subject to RSA 91-A. The department, in  
8 consultation with the working group, shall prepare a plan to close the cliff effect for individuals and  
9 families receiving public benefits. The plan shall include, but not be limited to, policy change  
10 recommendations, the development of a benefits cliff calculator which may be used by public and  
11 private employers to navigate and close the cliff effect.

12 VI. The working group shall submit an initial report on the plan including policy  
13 recommendations to the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate president, and the  
14 governor on or before December 1, 2019, and quarterly thereafter for the remainder of the biennium  
15 ending June 30, 2021.

16 VII. The sum of \$1 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020 and the sum of \$1 for the fiscal  
17 year ending June 30, 2021 are hereby appropriated to the department of health and human services  
18 for the purposes of developing and implementing the plan required in this section. The governor is  
19 authorized to draw a warrant for said sums out of any money in the treasury not otherwise  
20 appropriated.

21 76 Department of Health and Human Services; Plan for Patients Civilly Committed to the  
22 Secure Psychiatric Unit.

23 I. The department of health and human services shall develop a plan for repurposing space  
24 at the New Hampshire hospital made available by the transfer of certain children and by the  
25 accelerated discharge of patients at that facility who no longer need a hospital level of care. The  
26 plan shall consider renovation of all or part of the space to make it appropriate for persons now  
27 housed at the secure psychiatric unit, along with necessary changes in clinical, security, and other  
28 activities at New Hampshire hospital.

29 II. The plan shall be developed in consultation with the advisory council on patients civilly  
30 committed to the secure psychiatric unit, established in RSA 622:52-a, and shall be completed no  
31 later than June 1, 2020.

32 III. During the plan's development, the department shall review and consider the following:

33 (a) Other states that have facilities which simultaneously serve all categories of civilly  
34 committed persons.

35 (b) Input from the attorney general, the commissioner of the department of  
36 administrative services, advocacy organizations, professional associations, and the public.

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1 Unit. Amend RSA 622 by inserting after section 52 the following new section:

2 622:52-a Advisory Council on Patients Civilly Committed to the Secure Psychiatric Unit.

3 I. There is hereby established an advisory council on patients civilly committed to the  
4 secure psychiatric unit to assist the commissioner of the department of health and human services  
5 with the planning necessary to end the practice of placing civilly committed persons at the secure  
6 psychiatric unit. The members of the advisory council shall be:

7 (a) Five members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house

10 (c) The commissioner of the department of health and human services, or designee.

11 (d) The commissioner of the department of corrections, or designee.

12 (e) The director of medical and forensic services, department of corrections, or designee.

13 (f) The chief operating officer of the New Hampshire hospital, or designee.

14 (g) One member representing New Hampshire Legal Assistance, appointed by that  
15 organization.

16 (h) One member of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Hampshire, appointed by  
17 that organization.

18 (i) A representative of the National Alliance on Mental Illness New Hampshire,  
19 appointed by such organization.

20 (j) A representative of the New Hampshire Psychiatric Society, appointed by the society.

21 (k) A representative of the New Hampshire Community Behavioral Health Association,  
22 appointed by such organization.

23 (l) A representative of Advocates for Ethical Mental Health Treatment, appointed by  
24 such organization.

25 (m) A representative of the Community Support Network, Inc, appointed by that  
26 organization.

27 (n) Two members of the public, one of whom shall be a family member of a person who  
28 was civilly committed to the secure psychiatric unit, appointed by the governor.

29 II. The advisory council shall assist the commissioner of the department of health and  
30 human services in the development of plans for ending the practice of placing civilly committed  
31 persons at the secure psychiatric unit pursuant to RSA 622:45.

32 III. Legislative members shall receive mileage at the legislative rate while attending to the  
33 duties of the advisory council.

34 IV. The members of the advisory council shall elect a chairperson from among the  
35 members. The first meeting of the advisory council shall be called by the first-named house  
36 member. The first meeting of the advisory council shall be held within 30 days of the effective date  
37 of this section. Nine members of the advisory council shall constitute a quorum.

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1           V. The advisory council shall submit an annual report on November 1 of each year,  
2 commencing November 1, 2019, and a final report on November 1, 2022, detailing its activities and  
3 findings, together with any recommendations for proposed legislation, to the speaker of the house of  
4 representatives, the president of the senate, the chairpersons of the house criminal justice and  
5 public safety and the health, human services and elderly affairs committees, the chairpersons of the

29 foster care, or legal guardianship.

30 VIII. "Family and medical leave" means leave from work:

31 (a) Because of the birth of a child of the employee, within the past 12 months; or

32 (b) Because of the placement of a child with the employee for adoption, legal  
33 guardianship, or fostering, within the past 12 months; or

34 (c) Because of a serious health condition of a family member; or

35 (d) Because of a serious health condition of the employee that isn't related to  
36 employment; or

37 (e) Because of any qualifying exigency arising from the foreign deployment with the

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1 Armed Forces, or to care for a service member with a serious injury or illness as permitted under  
2 the federal Family and Medical Leave Act, 29 U.S.C. section 2612(a)(1)

3 IX. "FMLI" means family and medical leave insurance.

4 X. "Federal Family and Medical Leave Act" means the federal Family and Medical Leave  
5 Act of 1993, 29 U.S.C. section 28.

6 XI. "Serious health condition" means any illness covered by the federal Family and Medical  
7 Leave Act including treatment for addiction as prescribed by a treating clinician, consistent with  
8 American Society of Addiction Medicine criteria, as well as treatment for a mental health condition,  
9 consistent with American Psychiatric Association criteria.

10 XII. "Fund" means the family and medical leave insurance fund as described in RSA 282-  
11 B:4.

12 282-B:3 Employer Applicability.

13 I. This chapter applies to the state and nongovernmental employers beginning January 1,  
14 2020, provided that any employer may instead exercise a business option of: participating in a self-  
15 insured plan, self-insuring, purchasing insurance, providing benefits, or any combination thereof,  
16 upon employer application and certification by the commissioner or authorized representative that  
17 the employer will provide an equivalent benefit to all of its employees. If the employer is subject to  
18 a collective bargaining agreement, this chapter shall apply to the employer upon the effective date  
19 of the first successor collective bargaining agreement following January 1, 2020 to permit the  
20 employer and the union to negotiate the premium rate share under RSA 282-B:3, II. Political  
21 subdivisions of the state may opt into this chapter upon certification by the authorized  
22 representative that this chapter's insurance benefits are at least equivalent to the benefits provided  
23 under the collective bargaining agreement, provided the applicable bargaining unit has first ratified  
24 this option. Beginning January 1, 2020, this chapter shall be a mandatory subject of bargaining for  
25 collective bargaining agreements. Employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement in a  
26 political subdivision of the state may opt into this chapter if the political subdivision has not.

27 II. All employers subject to this chapter shall remit FMLI premium payments on a calendar  
28 quarter basis. These quarterly insurance premium payments shall amount to 0.5 percent of wages  
29 per employee per week for each week of the preceding quarter. Employers may withhold or divert  
30 no greater than 0.5 percent of wages per week per employee to satisfy this paragraph, provided that  
31 such employers provide employees, before employment commences, a department approved  
32 information sheet containing conspicuous language explaining the costs and benefits of the  
33 insurance.

34 III. The penalties for falsity by employers shall be in accordance and consistent with RSA  
35 282-A:166. The process for failing to adequately report shall be in accordance and consistent with  
36 RSA 282-A:151-152 and 282-A:166-a, and any resulting appeals shall be processed in accordance  
37 and consistent with RSA 282-A:94-98.

1           282-B:4 Family and Medical Leave Insurance Fund; Administration. The department shall  
2 create and administer a family and medical leave insurance fund for deposits of insurance payments  
3 paid pursuant to RSA 282-B:3, and accept any other deposit of moneys as authorized by law or by  
4 the commissioner or authorized representative. No FMLI fund moneys shall be commingled with  
5 unemployment insurance fund moneys. The department may withdraw or deduct from the FMLI  
6 fund where there are qualifying FMLI benefit payments or for any amounts reasonably necessary to  
7 implement and administer the provisions of this chapter or to repay any start-up loan.

8           282-B:5 Employer and Employee Responsibilities.

9           I. An employee shall both file an application with the department, including any applicable  
10 medical certification or birth certificate, and provide his or her employer with written notice of  
11 intent to take a leave of absence at least 30 days before the leave will begin unless the leave was not  
12 reasonably foreseeable or the time of the leave changes due to circumstances that were not  
13 reasonably foreseeable, provided, however, that the employee shall provide notice as soon as  
14 practicable. An employee's failure to provide required notice may delay or reduce benefits.

15           II. Any employee of an employer covered under the federal Family and Medical Leave Act  
16 who takes leave under this chapter shall be restored to the position he or she held in the application  
17 period or to an equivalent position by his or her employer. Employers shall continue to provide  
18 health insurance to employees during the leave, but employees remain responsible for any  
19 employee-shared costs associated with the health insurance benefits. Employers shall not retaliate  
20 against any employee solely for exercising his or her rights under this chapter.

21           III. An employer may require that leave taken under this chapter be taken concurrently or  
22 otherwise coordinated with leave allowed under the terms of a collective bargaining agreement or  
23 employer policy. The employer shall give individuals in its employ written notice of this  
24 requirement.

25           282-B:6 Eligibility Process, Calculation, and Appeals.

26           I. An employee shall be limited to up to 12 weeks of FMLI in any one application period.  
27 An employee shall have had premium payments remitted as a percent of his or her wages for at  
28 least 6 months to be eligible for benefits and shall have worked in employment resulting in wages in  
29 the amount of at least 1,040 multiplied by the applicable minimum wage, in either the "base period"  
30 or "alternative base period," as those terms are defined in RSA 282-A:2.

31           II. An employee shall be eligible for FMLI for reasons identified in paragraph I and RSA  
32 282-B:2, IX.

33           III. The calculation of weekly FMLI benefits shall be the highest quarter of wages in either  
34 the base period or alternate base period as defined in RSA 282-A:2, then divided by 13 and  
35 multiplied by 0.6, provided that no such calculation of FMLI benefits shall be less than \$125 per  
36 week or greater than 0.85 of the average weekly wage in New Hampshire. The calculation for  
37 partial FMLI benefits shall be in a manner consistent with RSA 282-A:14.

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1           IV. The process for FMLI benefits claims, violations, and any resulting appeals shall be in  
2 accordance and consistent with RSA 282-A:42 through RSA 282-A:68 and RSA 282-A:118.  
3 Processing of benefits claims and benefit payment may be administered by a third party selected  
4 through a request for proposals issued by the department. The standard and process for handling  
5 overpayments shall be in accordance and consistent with RSA 282-A:29, RSA 282-A:141-RSA 282-  
6 A:156 and RSA 282-A:165. In addition, an individual shall be disqualified from FMLI benefits  
7 beginning with the first day of the calendar week, and continuing for the next 26 weeks, in which  
8 the individual has been found to willfully made a false statement or misrepresentation regarding a  
9 material fact, or willfully failed to report a material fact, to obtain benefits under this chapter.

10           282-B:7 Limitations. Nothing in this chapter shall diminish an employer's obligation to comply  
11 with a collective bargaining agreement or employer policy, nor does this chapter, or any decision by  
12 the commissioner or authorized representative under this chapter, limit the ability of employers to  
13 provide FMLI benefits or benefits beyond what is required by this chapter.

14           282-B:8 Report and Outreach.

15           I. The department shall make public and provide semi-annual reports to the governor,  
16 senate president, speaker of the house of representatives, and the advisory council established  
17 pursuant to RSA 282-A:128 involving a summary to include but not be limited to, compliance with  
18 this chapter, payments into and out of the fund, fund balance, usage rates including for low wage  
19 employees, and retention of employees who received FMLI benefits.

20           II. The department shall develop and implement an outreach program to ensure that  
21 individuals who may be eligible to receive FMLI benefits under this chapter are made aware of  
22 these benefits. Outreach information shall explain in an easy to understand format, eligibility  
23 requirements, the claims process, weekly benefit amounts, maximum benefits available, notice  
24 requirements, reinstatement and non-discrimination rights, confidentiality, and coordination of  
25 leave under this chapter and other laws, collective bargaining agreements, and employer policies.

26           282-B:9 Rulemaking. The commissioner shall adopt rules, pursuant to RSA 541-A, relative to  
27 this chapter. In adopting rules, the commissioner shall maintain consistency with the rules adopted  
28 to implement the federal Family and Medical Leave Act, to the extent such rules are not in conflict  
29 with this chapter.

30           282-B:10 Sustainability Mechanism. The commissioner shall continuously monitor the  
31 solvency of the fund. Should the commissioner determine at any time that the solvency of the fund  
32 is in jeopardy, or that the fund is in excess of necessary funds, the commissioner shall provide the  
33 advisory council with data supporting such solvency determination and may prospectively, effective  
34 in a future calendar quarter, increase or reduce FMLI premiums in RSA 282-B:3, II, decrease the  
35 benefits payable in RSA 282-B:6, III, or decrease the allowable length of leave in RSA 282-B:6, I, or  
36 any combination thereof, provided such prospective changes are cumulatively no greater than or  
37 less than 10 percent of those required under this chapter. If the commissioner thereafter



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1 determines such changes are no longer necessary for fund solvency the commissioner shall reverse  
2 such changes. Advance notice of any and all changes pursuant to this paragraph shall be provided  
3 to all covered employers and employees.

4 282-B:11 Family and Medical Leave Insurance Program; Funding Transfer and Repayment.  
5 The state treasurer shall transfer funds from the general fund to the department of employment  
6 security for payment of the initial administrative and implementation costs associated with this  
7 chapter. Within the first 5 years after the family and medical leave insurance program becomes  
8 operational, the department shall repay the general fund transfer in installments from funds  
9 deducted from the family medical leave insurance fund.

10 96 Advisory Council. Amend RSA 282-A:128 to read as follows:

11 282-A:128 Advisory Council. There is hereby created within the unemployment compensation  
12 bureau an advisory council on unemployment compensation *and family medical leave*  
13 *insurance*, hereinafter called the advisory council. The advisory council shall consist of 9 members  
14 to be appointed, with the exception of the legislative members, by the governor with the consent  
15 and advice of the governor's council. Three of the appointees of this advisory council shall be  
16 persons who, because of their vocations, employment or affiliations, shall be classed as representing  
17 the point of view of employers; 3 shall be persons who, because of their vocations, employment or  
18 affiliations, shall be classed as representing the point of view of employees; one shall be a senator

24 and discussing problems related to the administration of this chapter *and RSA 282-B* and in  
25 assuring impartiality and freedom from political influence in the solution of such problems.  
26 Advisory council meetings shall provide opportunity for public comment. *The advisory council*  
27 *shall quarterly review and evaluate family medical leave insurance and, after 2 years of*  
28 *administration, the commissioner shall assess utilization, finances, and benefit levels and*  
29 *provide the general court with rate adjustment or fiscal recommendations.*

30 97 New Subparagraph; State Treasurer; Application of Receipts. Amend RSA 6:12, I(b) by  
31 inserting after subparagraph (343) the following new subparagraph:

32 (344) Moneys deposited in the family and medical leave insurance fund established  
33 in RSA 282-B:4.

34 98 Repeal. RSA 6:12, I(b)(237), relative to the moneys deposited in the civil legal services fund,  
35 is repealed.

36 99 Civil Legal Assistance. Amend RSA 525-A:1 and 525-A:2 to read as follows:

37 525-A:1 [~~Civil Legal Assistance~~] *Statement of Purpose*. Funds appropriated to New

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1 Hampshire Legal Assistance for the purposes of civil legal assistance shall be used ~~[only for the~~  
2 ~~provision of civil legal representation to low-income persons in this state. New Hampshire Legal~~  
3 ~~Assistance shall make reports to the judicial council by June 30 and December 31 of each year on its~~  
4 ~~use of state funds] **to enable the state to fund civil legal services to low-income persons in**~~

6 525-A:2 Civil Legal Services [Fund]. ~~[There is established in the office of the state treasurer a~~

8 ~~distributed to] **Funds appropriated to** New Hampshire Legal Assistance ~~[to]~~ **shall** be used to  
9 ~~[establish and operate offices in the cities of Nashua and Concord to]~~ provide civil legal services to  
10 low-income persons in ~~[the cities of Nashua and Concord and the surrounding areas, and to provide~~

16 100 Health Facilities Licensure; Applicability of Moratorium. Amend RSA 151:2, VI(a) to read  
17 as follows:

18 VI.(a) No new license shall be issued for, and there shall be no increase in licensed capacity  
19 of, any nursing home, skilled nursing facility, intermediate care facility, or rehabilitation facility,  
20 including rehabilitation hospitals and facilities offering comprehensive rehabilitation services. This  
21 moratorium shall not apply to any rehabilitation facility whose sole purpose is to treat individuals  
22 for substance use disorder or mental health issues **or to any continuing care facility for which**  
23 **a certificate of authority has been issued by the insurance commissioner pursuant to RSA**  
24 **420-D:2.**

25 101 New Chapter; Sports Betting. Amend RSA by inserting after chapter 287-H the following  
26 new chapter:

27 CHAPTER 287-I  
28 SPORTS BETTING

29 287-I:1 Definitions. In this chapter:

30 I. "Agent" means a party who is authorized by contract or agreement with the commission  
31 to conduct a sports book.

32 II. "Authorized sports bettor" means an individual 18 years of age or older who is physically  
33 present in the state of New Hampshire when placing a sports wager with the commission or an  
34 authorized agent of the commission and is not a prohibited sports bettor.

35 III. "Collegiate sports event" means a sports or athletic event participated in or offered or  
36 sponsored by a public or private institution that offers educational services beyond the secondary  
37 level.

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1 IV. "Commission" means the lottery commission.

2 V. "Director" means the executive director of the lottery commission or designee.

3 VI. "High school sports event" " means a sports or athletic event participated in or offered  
4 or sponsored by a public or private institution that offers educational services at the secondary  
5 level.

6 VII. "In-play sports wager" means a sports wager on a sports event after the sports event  
7 has begun and before it ends.

8 VIII. "Mobile sports wagering platform" means the combination of hardware, software, and  
9 data networks used to manage, administer, record, or control sports wagers.

10 IX. "Professional sports event" means an event at which 2 or more persons participate in a  
11 sports or athletic event and receive compensation in excess of actual expenses for their participation  
12 in such event.

13 X. "Prohibited sports bettor" means:

14 (a) Any member or employee of the commission and any spouse, child, sibling, or parent  
15 residing in the same household as a member or employee of the commission.

16 (b) Any principal or employee of any agent.

17 (c) Any contractor of the commission or its agent when such contract relates to the  
18 conduct of sports wagering.

19 (d) Any contractor or employee of an entity that conducts sports wagering in another  
20 jurisdiction when the bettor possesses confidential nonpublic information as a result of his or her  
21 contract or employment relating to the wager being placed.

22 (e) Any amateur or professional athlete if the sports wager is based in whole or part on  
23 a sport or athletic event overseen by the athlete's governing sports body.

24 (f) Any sports agent, owner or employee of a team, player, umpire, referee, coach, union  
25 official, or official of a sports governing body if the sports wager is based in whole or part on a sport  
26 or athletic event overseen by the governing body which oversees the individual's sport.

27 (g) Any individual placing a wager as an agent of or proxy for a prohibited sports bettor.

28 (h) Any person under the age of 18.

29 XI. "Prohibited sports event" means:

30 (a) A collegiate sports event in which one of the participants is a collegiate team of a  
31 college institution that is primarily located in New Hampshire;

32 (b) A collegiate sports event that takes place in New Hampshire;

33 (c) Any high school sports event in any location;

34 (d) Any amateur sports event where the participants are primarily under the age of 18;  
35 provided that "prohibited sports event" does not include the games of a collegiate sports tournament  
36 in which a New Hampshire college team participates, nor does it include any games of a collegiate  
37 sports tournament that occurs outside New Hampshire even though some of the individual games

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1 or events are held in New Hampshire; and provided further that sports wagers are permitted on  
2 collegiate sports tournament games in which a New Hampshire college team participates only if the  
3 outcome of the wager is based on the outcome of all games within the tournament.

4 XII. "Sports governing body" means the organization that prescribes final rules and  
5 enforces codes of conduct with respect to a sporting event and participants therein.

6 XIII. "Sports book" means the business of accepting wagers on any sports event by any  
7 system or method of wagering.

8 XIV. "Sports wager" means cash or cash equivalent paid by an individual to participate in  
9 sports wagering.

10 XV. "Sports wagering" means wagering on sporting events or any portion thereof, or on the  
11 individual performance statistics of athletes participating in a sports event, or combination of sports  
12 events, by any system or method of wagering, including but not limited to in person communication  
13 and electronic communication through Internet websites accessed via a mobile device or computer  
14 and mobile device applications. The term sports wagering shall include, but not be limited to, single  
15 game bets, teaser bets, parlays, over-under bets, money line bets, books, exchange wagering, in  
16 game wagering, in-play bets, proposition bets, and straight bets.

17 XVI. "Tier I sports wager" means a sports wager that is placed before the start of the sports  
18 event and is determined solely by the final score or final outcome of that single sports event.

19 XVII. "Tier II sports wager" means an in-play sports wager.

20 XVIII. "Tier III sports wager" means a sports wager that is neither a tier I or tier II wager.

21 287-I:2 Sports Book Authorized. The commission is authorized to operate a sports book for the  
22 purposes of accepting and paying sports wagers by authorized bettors within the state in  
23 conformance with the requirements of this chapter.

24 287-I:3 Commission Agents. The commission shall conduct a sports book for sports wagering  
25 through agents selected through a competitive bid process and approved by the governor and  
26 executive council. Any such contract shall be based on the state receiving a percentage of revenue  
27 from sports wagering activities within the state. The commission shall ensure that an agent  
28 demonstrates financial stability, responsibility, good character, honesty, and integrity. In selecting  
29 an agent, the commission shall consider, at a minimum, the experience and background of the  
30 agent, the agent's ability to serve proposed locations for sports book retail operations, the agent's  
31 mobile and Internet capabilities, the agent's contribution to economic development within the state,  
32 the agent's commitment to prevention of problem gambling, to responsible gaming, and to integrity  
33 in betting. The commission shall select a group of bidders who best meet the criteria set forth in  
34 this paragraph and select from that group the agent or agents whose bid provides the state with the  
35 highest percentage of revenue from the sports wagering activities covered by the bid, provided that  
36 the commission determines that the bidder's commitment to return said revenue percentage to the  
37 state is consistent with the bidder's commitment to meet all other criteria specified in the bid

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1 request and in applicable law. All agents shall be subject to criminal and financial background  
2 checks as prescribed by the commission. The commission may retain vendors to support the  
3 commission in operating a sports book.

4 287-I:4 Commission Directed Sports Wagering. The commission is further authorized to  
5 directly offer lottery games to authorized bettors within the state in the form of tier III sports  
6 wagers through the commission's lottery retailers subject to the provisions of this chapter.

7 287-I:5 Sports Book Retail Operations. The commission and its agents are further authorized  
8 to operate physical sports book retail locations within the state for the purposes of accepting tier I  
9 and tier III sports wagers from authorized bettors and paying prizes relating to those wagers. The  
10 sports book retail locations may be co-located with other commercial businesses or general  
11 commercial retail locations. No more than 10 sports book retail locations may be in operation at any  
12 given time.

13 287-I:6 Local Option for Operation of Sports Book Retail Locations.

14 I. Any town or city may allow the operation of a sports book retail location according to the  
15 provisions of this subdivision, in the following manner, excepting that nothing in this section shall  
16 be construed to prohibit Internet or mobile wagering or lottery games involving tier III sports  
17 wagers in the jurisdiction, if so authorized by the passage of this statute.

18 (a) In a town, the question shall be placed on the warrant of an annual town meeting  
19 under the procedures set out in RSA 39:3, and shall be voted on a ballot. In a city, the legislative  
20 body may vote to place the question on the official ballot for any regular municipal election, or, in  
21 the alternative, shall place the question on the official ballot for any regular municipal election  
22 upon submission to the legislative body of a petition signed by 25 of the registered voters.

23 (b) The selectmen, aldermen, or city council shall hold a public hearing on the question  
24 at least 15 days but not more than 30 days before the question is to be voted on. Notice of the  
25 hearing shall be posted in at least 2 public places in the municipality and published in a newspaper  
26 of general circulation at least 7 days before the hearing.

27 (c) The wording of the question shall be substantially as follows: "Shall we allow the  
28 operation of sports book retail locations within the town or city?"

29 II. If a majority of those voting on the question vote "Yes", sports book retail locations may  
30 be operated within the town or city.

31 III. If the question is not approved, the question may later be voted upon according to the  
32 provisions of paragraph I at the next annual town meeting or regular municipal election.

33 IV. A municipality that has voted to allow the operation of sports book retail locations may  
34 consider rescinding its action in the manner described in paragraph I of this section.

35 V. An unincorporated place may allow the operation of a physical sports book retail location  
36 by majority vote of the county delegation, after a public hearing is held.

37 VI. The commission shall maintain a list of municipalities where sports book retail locations

1 may be placed into operation.

2 287-I:7 Mobile Sports Wagering Authorized. The commission and its agent are authorized to  
3 operate a sports book through a mobile sports wagering platform by mobile devices or over the  
4 Internet. With respect to mobile sports wagering, the commission, either independently, or through  
5 its agent, shall provide:

6 I. Age verification measures to be undertaken to block access to and prevent sports wagers  
7 by persons under the age of 18 years.

8 II. Identity verification through secure online databases or by examination of photo  
9 identification.

10 III. That electronic data related to sports wagers must be initiated and received within the  
11 geographic borders of the state of New Hampshire and may not be intentionally routed outside of  
12 the state. The incidental intermediate routing of electronic data shall not determine the location or  
13 locations in which a bet or wager is initiated, received, or otherwise made.

14 IV. Wager limits for daily, weekly, and monthly amounts for each player and account  
15 consistent with the best practices in addressing problem gambling.

16 V. A voluntary self-exclusion program for players to self-exclude themselves from wagering  
17 for set periods of time.

18 VI. Security mechanisms to ensure the confidentiality of wagering and personal and  
19 financial information except as otherwise authorized by this chapter.

20 287-I:8 Sports Wagering Supervision. The commission shall create a division of sports  
21 wagering which will be responsible for ensuring compliance with the requirements of this chapter  
22 and any rules adopted by the commission in accordance with the authorities granted under this  
23 chapter. In addition, the division, under the direction of the director and commission, shall ensure  
24 that the commission's agents and vendors comply with the following obligations:

25 I. Each agent or vendor engaged in sports wagering shall submit a security and internal  
26 control report for the division's review and approval prior to conducting any sports wagering within  
27 the state and every year thereafter. This report shall address all aspects of security and controls  
28 including physical security, personnel security, and computer systems security including:

29 (a) Surveillance plans for all retail sports book locations, including surveillance  
30 coverage and direct access for the commission to the surveillance system.

31 (b) User access controls for sports book personnel.

32 (c) Segregation of duties within the sports book.

33 (d) Employment background checks and policies.

34 (e) Automated and manual risk management procedures.

35 (f) Procedures for identifying and reporting fraud and suspicious conduct.

36 (g) Procedures to establish connectivity with monitoring services or sports governing  
37 bodies relating to suspicious activity.

1           (h) Any and all monitoring systems utilized by the agent or vendor to report and receive  
2 information on suspicious betting activities.

3           (i) Systems and procedures to prevent prohibited sports bettors from placing wagers.

4           (j) Description of anti-money laundering compliance standards.

5           (k) Descriptions of all integrated third-party systems or components and the security  
6 procedures relating to those systems.

7           II. For each wagering computer system used to conduct sports wagering, including all  
8 mobile sports wagering platforms within the state, the agent or vendor providing such system shall  
9 provide a detailed computer system security report to be approved by the commission prior to the  
10 acceptance of wagers and each year thereafter. The report shall address the issues set forth in the  
11 security and internal control report along with the following:

12           (a) Documented system security testing performed by a licensed third-party contractor  
13 approved by the commission;

14           (b) A description of all software applications that comprise the system;

15           (c) A procedure for third-party auditing of financial transactions received by the system;

16           (d) A description of all types of wagers supported by the system;

17           (e) Unique identification and verification systems for wagers;

18           (f) Procedures to prevent past posting of wagers;

19           (g) A list of data recorded relating to each wager;

20           (h) System redundancy to ensure recording of wagers during a system outage;

21           (i) A mechanism to provide read only access to the commission to the back office system  
22 for the purposes of reviewing and auditing wagering activities;

23           (j) Integration with an independent control system to ensure integrity of system  
24 wagering information;

25           (k) Capabilities for canceling existing wagers, freezing or suspending wagering across  
26 the platform, or for specific events; and

27           (l) Any other issue identified by the division upon review of the proposed gaming  
28 system.

29           III. Each agent engaged in sports wagering shall submit house rules for the division's  
30 review and approval prior to conducting any sports wagering within the state and every year  
31 thereafter. These house rules shall include at a minimum:

32           (a) The method for calculation and payment of winning wagers.

33           (b) The effect of schedule changes for a sports event.

34           (c) The method of notifying bettors of odds or proposition changes.

35           (d) Acceptance of wagers at terms other than those posted.

36           (e) Expiration dates for winning tickets.

37           (f) Rules for payment of wagers made after a material error in setting odds or a

1 proposition for an event by the sports book.

2 (g) Method of contacting the agent or vendor for questions or complaints.

3 (h) Description of those persons who are prohibited from wagering with the agent or  
4 contractor if broader than the prohibited bettors list set forth in this section.

5 (i) The method and location for posting and publishing the approved house rules.

6 IV. Each agent or vendor engaged in sports wagering shall submit accounting controls for  
7 the division's review and approval prior to conducting any sports wagering within the state and  
8 every year thereafter. These accounting controls shall include at a minimum:

9 (a) A process for documenting and verifying beginning of day cash balance;

10 (b) Processes for recording collection of wagers, payment of wagers, and cancellation of  
11 wagers issued;

12 (c) Processes for handling cash within sports book retail locations including segregation  
13 of duties related to counting and storage of cash; and

14 (d) The establishment of a segregated account related to New Hampshire sports  
15 wagering activities.

16 V. The commission's agent shall submit a responsible gaming plan for the division's review  
17 and approval prior to conducting any sports wagering within the state and every year thereafter.  
18 This plan should include identification of posting and materials related to problem gaming,  
19 resources to be made available to bettors expressing concerns about problem gaming, house imposed  
20 player limits, and self-exclusion programs.

21 VI. The commission's agent shall maintain a cash reserve available to pay wagers as  
22 determined by the commission.

23 VII. The commission's agent or vendor shall not accept any wager on a sports event unless  
24 it has received approval from the commission to conduct that type or category of wager. A type of  
25 wager refers to the method of determining the outcome of the wager. The category refers to the  
26 kind of event being wagered on. The commission shall approve wager categories and types in a  
27 reasonable time frame. Once a particular category or wager type is approved for its first use it may  
28 be used on multiple events without further approval.

29 VIII. The commission shall only approve wagers on categories of events where:

30 (a) The outcome can be verified;

31 (b) The outcome can be generated by a reliable and independent process; and

32 (c) The event is conducted in conformity with applicable laws.

33 IX. Wagers made under this section shall be made with:

34 (a) Cash;

35 (b) Cash equivalent;

36 (c) PayPal;

37 (d) Debit card;



- 1           (e) ACH;
- 2           (f) Promotional funds; and
- 3           (g) Any other means approved by the executive director.

4           X. Any agent or contractor who sends or receives electronic data related to sports wagers is  
5 responsible to ensure that any transfer of that data is initiated and completed within the state of  
6 New Hampshire and that only incidental intermediate routing of the electronic data occurs outside  
7 of the state. The agent and contractor shall be responsible for periodically reviewing their  
8 information technology systems and networks to ensure compliance with this section.

9           287-I:9 Proceeds to Education Fund. The proceeds received by the commission from sports  
10 wagering, less the administrative costs of the commission, prizes paid, and payments for problem  
11 gambling services, shall be deposited in the education trust fund established in RSA 198:39.

12           287-I:10 Limitations on Sports Wagers. The commission and its agents are prohibited from the  
13 following activities:

14           I. Accepting or making payment relating to sports wagers made by prohibited sports  
15 bettors.

16           II. Accepting sports wagers on prohibited sports events.

17           III. Accepting sports wagers from persons who are physically outside of the state of New  
18 Hampshire at the time of the sports wager.

19           287-I:11 Disclosure of Data Source. The commission and agents shall publicly disclose the  
20 source of the data that will be used to determine the outcome of a tier II or tier III wager.

21           287-I:12 Risk Management. The commission's agent may take any risk management strategies  
22 as authorized by the director.

23           287-I:13 Maintaining Sports Integrity. The commission and agent may participate in national  
24 and international monitoring services and associations and may share betting information with  
25 those entities and sports governing bodies in order to ensure the integrity of sports wagers and  
26 sports events. The director may restrict, limit, or exclude wagering on a sports event if he or she  
27 determines that such an action is necessary to ensure the integrity of the sports book.

28           287-I:14 Financial Reports. The commission may seek financial and compliance reports from  
29 its agent periodically and may conduct audits of these reports to ensure that the state receives the  
30 agreed upon revenue sharing proceeds.

31           287-I:15 Compliance Reviews. The commission shall retain oversight of its agent to ensure that  
32 all sports wagering activities are conducted in accordance with this statute and any rules adopted  
33 by the commission.

34           287-I:16 Fantasy Sports Exempted. Nothing in this chapter shall apply to fantasy sports  
35 contests authorized pursuant to RSA 287-H.

36           287-I:17 Rulemaking. The commission shall adopt rules, pursuant to RSA 541-A, relative to the  
37 operation, conduct, location, and oversight of sports books. The commission may enact emergency

1 rules, which will take effect upon approval.

2 102 Bets Void. Amend RSA 338:2 to read as follows:

3 338:2 Bets Void. ***Except as authorized by the lottery commission***, all bets and wagers upon  
4 any question where the parties have no interest in the subject except that created by the wager are  
5 void; and either party may recover any property by him ***or her*** deposited, paid, or delivered upon  
6 such wager or its loss, and repel any action brought for anything, the right or claim to which grows  
7 out of such bet or wager.

8 103 Education Trust Fund; Sports Betting Added. Amend RSA 198:39, I(k) to read as follows:

9 (k) Funds collected and paid over to the state treasurer by the lottery commission

11 104 New Subparagraph; Gambling; Exceptions. Amend RSA 647:2, V by inserting after  
12 subparagraph (e) the following new subparagraph:

13 (f) Sports wagering as defined by RSA 287-I:1, XV.

14 105 New Chapter; Council for Responsible Gambling. Amend RSA by inserting after chapter  
15 338-A the following new chapter:

16 CHAPTER 338-B

17 COUNCIL FOR RESPONSIBLE GAMBLING

18 338-B:1 Definitions. In this chapter, "council" means the council for responsible gambling.

19 338-B:2 Statement of Purpose. Education, prevention, and treatment relating to gambling  
20 disorders are an integral part of a responsible gaming environment within the state.

21 338-B:3 Establishment. There is established the council for responsible gambling which shall  
22 promote education, prevention, and treatment of problem gambling within the state.

23 338-B:4 Membership.

24 I. The council shall consist of 5 members appointed by the governor and executive council  
25 and shall be qualified in the field of addiction or mental health services with a focus on problem  
26 gambling and shall be residents of the state. A member may be removed by the governor and  
27 executive council only for cause shown in accordance with RSA 4:1. The members shall elect one of  
28 their number as chairperson. Three members of the council shall constitute a quorum.

29 II. Members shall serve 3 year terms and until their successors are appointed; provided  
30 that for the initial appointments only, one member shall be appointed to a term of one year, 2  
31 members shall be appointed to a term of 2 years and 2 members shall be appointed to a term of 3  
32 years. Any vacancy shall be filled for the unexpired terms.

33 III. Members of the council shall receive mileage at the rate of state employees when  
34 attending meetings of the council or performing duties on behalf of the council.

35 338-B:5 Powers and Duties. The council shall have the authority to enter into grants and  
36 contracts for the purposes of furthering education, prevention, and treatment of problem gambling  
37 within the state.

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1       338-B:6 Report of the Council. The council shall submit a biennial report to the governor and  
2 executive council on or before October 1 of each even-numbered year. The report shall include a  
3 description of the council's activities including a financial report for the relevant time period.

4       338-B:7 Administrative Attachment. The council shall be administratively attached to the  
5 lottery commission in accordance with RSA 21-G:10. In addition to the support provided to an

23       107 Tobacco Tax; Definitions. Amend RSA 78:1, XVI to read as follows:

24           XIV. "Tobacco products" means ***any product containing, made, or derived from***  
25 ***tobacco or nicotine that is intended for human consumption, including but not limited to***  
26 ***cigarettes, *electronic cigarettes*, loose tobacco, smokeless tobacco, and cigars***~~[, but].~~ ***Tobacco***  
27 ***products*** shall not include premium cigars ***or any product that has been approved by the***  
28 ***United States Food and Drug Administration for sale as a tobacco cessation product and***  
29 ***is being marketed and sold exclusively for such approved use.***

30       108 New Paragraph; Electronic Cigarette; Definition. Amend RSA 78:1 by inserting after

10 XXXI-aa to read as follows:

18 in RSA 21:34-a. "Farmers' market" shall not include any event held upon any premises owned,  
19 leased, or otherwise controlled by any individual vendor selling therein.

20 [~~XXXI-aa.~~] XXXI-aaa. "Food" means solid nutritive material as distinguished from drink.

21 111 Definition of License. Amend RSA 175:1, XXXIX to read as follows:

22 XXXIX. "License" means the authority granted by the commission to engage in the sale of  
23 liquor, wine, beverages, [~~or~~] tobacco products, **or e-cigarettes** otherwise unlawful unless evidenced  
24 by such document.

25 112 Definition of Retailer. Amend RSA 175:1, LIX-a to read as follows:

26 LIX-a. "Retailer," when used with respect to tobacco products **or e-cigarettes**, means any  
27 person who sells tobacco products **or e-cigarettes** to consumers, and any vending machine in which  
28 tobacco products are sold.

29 113 Liquor Commission; Liquor Investigator. Amend RSA 176:9, III to read as follows:

30 III. The commissioner, deputy commissioner, assistant, or liquor investigator may enter  
31 any place where liquor, beverages, [~~or~~] tobacco products, **e-cigarettes** are sold or manufactured, at  
32 any time, and may examine any license or permit issued or purported to have been issued under the  
33 terms of this title. They shall make complaints for violations of this title.

28 without prior approval of the commission. No rebate shall be allowed for cash registers

30 III. The commission may suspend the tobacco, **e-cigarettes**, or alcohol sales portion of the  
31 license separately under the provisions of RSA 179:57; any revocation shall revoke the entire  
32 license.

33 117 Retail Wine License; Sale of Tobacco Products. Amend RSA 178:19 to read as follows:

34 178:19 Retail Wine License.

35 I. A retail wine license may be issued by the commission to any person operating a retail  
36 outlet in this state which shall allow the licensee to sell tobacco products, **e-cigarettes**, fortified  
37 wines, and table wines directly to individuals at retail on the premises for consumption off the

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1 premises; provided, however, that persons holding any license authorizing the sale of liquor or wine  
2 by the glass under this chapter shall sell the wines authorized pursuant to this section in a separate

14 which shall be capable of separately registering wine sales, and such rooms shall have an attendant

17 or lounge, and separate sales records shall be maintained for this purpose.

19 license separately under the provisions of RSA 179:57; any revocation shall revoke the entire  
20 license.

21 118 Retail Tobacco License; Sale of E-Cigarettes. Amend RSA 178:19-a to read as follows:

23 I. The commission may issue a retail tobacco license to a person engaged in the business of  
24 retail sales and distribution of tobacco products **or e-cigarettes** in this state. Each retail outlet

7 123 Council for Teacher Education; Commissioner Designee. Amend RSA 190:2 to read as

10 education, ***or his or her designee***, and the chairman of the department of education of the  
11 university of New Hampshire; 3 members appointed by them for terms not exceeding 3 years, one

2 II.(a) No person shall construct or install, operate or maintain an artificial swimming pool  
3 or bathing place open to and used by the public, or as a part of a business venture, or a public  
4 bathing facility unless the construction, design and physical specifications of such pool or bathing  
5 place have received prior approval by from the department. The department shall charge a non-  
6 refundable registration fee of \$100 for a pool 400 square feet in area and an additional \$25 for every  
7 additional 100 square feet. The fee shall be paid to the department upon submission of such plans  
8 for review. Fees collected under this paragraph shall be deposited in the public bathing facility  
9 program fund.

5           ***I. The department shall consist of the militia, which shall include the army***  
6 ***national guard, air national guard, the inactive national guard, the state guard, and the***  
7 ***unorganized militia, and veterans services, which shall include the division of veterans***  
8 ***services, the state veterans cemetery, the division of community based military programs,***  
9 ***the veterans council, and the military leadership team.***

10           ***II. The department shall be led by an adjutant general.***

11       ***110-B:1-a*** Composition of the Militia.

12           I. The militia shall be divided into 3 classes, namely the national guard, the state guard,  
13 and the unorganized militia.

14           II. The national guard shall consist of an army national guard, an air national guard, and  
15 an inactive national guard. As used in this chapter, the term "national guard" shall mean and refer  
16 to the army national guard and the air national guard unless otherwise indicated.

17           III. The state guard shall consist of those persons serving in accordance with the provisions  
18 of RSA 111.

19           IV. The unorganized militia shall consist of all able-bodied residents of the state who are 18  
20 years of age or older, who are, or have declared their intention to become, citizens of the United  
21 States, and who are not serving in the national guard or the state guard.

22           V. When authorized by the laws and regulations of the United States, there shall be an  
23 additional section of the state guard to be known as the New Hampshire naval militia.

24       143 The Adjutant General. Amend RSA 110-B:8, II and III to read as follows:

25           II. The adjutant general shall be the chief of staff to the governor and shall be the executive  
26 head of the ~~[adjutant general's]~~ department ***of military affairs and veterans services.*** The  
27 adjutant general may perform any act authorized by this chapter or by the regulations issued  
28 pursuant thereto through or with the aid of such officers of the national guard or other personnel as  
29 the adjutant general may designate. The adjutant general shall exercise and perform all powers,  
30 functions and duties which are or may be imposed by the laws and regulations of the United States.  
31 It shall be the duty of the adjutant general to direct the planning and employment of the forces of

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1           IV. The division of community based military programs shall collaborate, coordinate, and  
2 communicate with military and civilian provider groups in the delivery of services to New  
3 Hampshire veterans, service members, and their families.

4           V. The military leadership team and veterans council shall serve as advisory bodies and  
5 shall provide advice and guidance to the adjutant general regarding the delivery of services to  
6 veterans and military service members and their families.

7           110-B:84 Division of Veterans Services. The division of veterans services under the supervision  
8 of a director of veterans services shall:

9           I. Assist veterans who are residents of this state or their dependents to secure all benefits  
10 or preferences to which they may be entitled under any state or federal laws or regulations. The  
11 division shall employ such assistance as may be necessary, within the limits of the appropriation  
12 made therefor, subject to the rules of the state division of personnel.

13           II. Biennially, beginning July 1, 2019, publish and distribute a state veteran's handbook  
14 which shall include the following information:

15           (a) Points of contact for all federal, state, local, and nonprofit veterans agencies,  
16 departments, councils, hospitals, clinics, and other organizations offering services, benefits, and  
17 programs to New Hampshire veterans, including addresses, telephone numbers, and e-mail  
18 addresses.

19           (b) A description of the services, benefits, and programs offered by each entity listed  
20 under subparagraph (a).

21           III. Accept and expend for purposes of publishing and distributing the state veterans  
22 handbook, any donations, grants, bequests, and contributions which become available for such  
23 purposes.

24           110-B:85 Director of the Division of Veterans Services.

25           I. The adjutant general shall, with the approval of the governor and council, appoint a  
26 director of the division of veterans services, who shall be a veteran as defined in RSA 21:50.

27           II. The director shall:

28           (a) Supervise the activities of a statewide service delivery structure which assists  
29 veterans and family members in identifying eligibility for veterans benefits, filing claims,  
30 coordinating benefits with other state and federal agencies, and reviewing claims decisions for  
31 appeals or waivers of unfavorable decisions.

32           (b) Identify and develop legislative proposals to improve delivery of services, review and  
33 monitor legislation introduced by others, testify at hearings, and prepare legislative fiscal note work

3 (e) Represent the adjutant general at various state and national conventions,  
4 conferences, and public functions and provide supervision to the division of veterans services' public  
5 relations program.

6 (f) Perform such other duties as the adjutant general shall determine.

7 110-B:86 Copies of Public Records. When a copy of any public record is required by the  
8 Department of Veterans Affairs to be used in determining the eligibility of any person to participate  
9 in benefits made available by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, the official  
10 custodian of such public record shall without charge provide the applicant for such benefits or any  
11 person acting on his or her behalf or the authorized representative of the United States Department  
12 of Veterans Affairs with a certified copy of such record; provided, however, that in any case where  
13 the copy is made by a town clerk whose official income is derived in part or entirely from fees a  
14 charge for services hereunder shall be made and the town shall reimburse the clerk for the charges.

15 110-B:87 Donations and Bequests. The division of veterans services may receive, on behalf of  
16 the state, all donations and bequests that may be made to support the delivery of state office of  
17 veterans services programs.

18 110-B:88 Division of Community Based Military Programs. The division of community based  
19 military programs, under the supervision of an administrator of community based military  
20 programs shall facilitate military and civilian partnerships by collaborating, coordinating, and  
21 communicating with military and civilian provider groups in the delivery of services to New  
22 Hampshire veterans, service members, and their families. The administrator shall:

23 I. Develop and implement innovative, effective, and sustainable provider engagement  
24 projects to increase education, outreach, and engagement with military-access resources.

25 II. Integrate military and civilian community and coalition networks and strengthen  
26 military-civilian community supports by integrating those supports into civilian structures.

27 III. Advocate for federal and state funding to target system changes to improve services.

28 IV. Ensure cost efficiency through decreased overlap, service redundancy and increased  
29 service fidelity.

30 V. Develop and provide oversight for New Hampshire's care coordination, including  
31 services and supports addressing substance misuse, homelessness, suicide prevention, mental  
32 health, sexual military trauma, unemployment, domestic violence, education, and legal support.

33 VI. Authorize, evaluate, and monitor the administration of federal and state grants.

34 VII. Initiate and facilitate state planning processes to improve access, navigation, and  
35 coordination of military-civilian services and support.

36 VIII. Compile and analyze program statistics and metrics to evaluate the effectiveness of  
37 the system of care, initiatives, and special projects, including the efforts of legislative, statewide,

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1 and community coalitions across the state.

2 110-B:89 State Veterans Council Established.

3 I. There shall be a state veterans council of 4 members to be appointed by the governor and  
4 council, 3 of whom shall be veterans as defined by RSA 21:50. The fourth member shall be a family  
5 member of a veteran or family member of a currently serving member of the armed forces. All  
6 council members shall be citizens of New Hampshire. Of the first appointments of veterans under  
7 this section one shall be appointed for a term of 3 years, one for a term of 2 years, one for a term of

4 148 Repeal. RSA 115, relative to the state office of veterans services, is repealed.

5 149 Sale of Property; National Guard Armory in Berlin. The adjutant general and the  
6 department of military affairs and veterans services are authorized to offer for sale the national  
7 guard armory land and buildings in the city of Berlin. The adjutant general and the department  
8 shall submit quarterly reports on the progress of the sale to the fiscal committee of the general  
9 court. Any sale of such land and buildings shall be subject to the requirements of RSA 4:40. All  
10 proceeds from the sale may be used for the purchase of a new armory in general proximity to the  
11 current armory in Berlin, and any proceeds from the sale that are not used for such a purchase

6 153 Repeal. RSA 6:12, I(b)(267), relative to moneys deposited in the workers' compensation  
7 fraud fund, is repealed.

8 154 Administration of Transportation Laws; Certification of Current Workers' Compensation  
9 Coverage Required. Amend RSA 228:4-b, IV to read as follows:

10 IV. All funds collected under this section shall be deposited into the ~~[general fund]~~  
11 **department of labor restricted fund established pursuant to RSA 273:1-b.**

12 155 New Subdivision; Governor's Finish Line New Hampshire Scholarship Program. Amend  
13 RSA 188-F by inserting after section 68 the following new subdivision:

Governor's Finish Line New Hampshire Scholarship Program

15 188-F:69 Governor's Finish Line New Hampshire Scholarship Program.

16 I. The community college system of New Hampshire may establish and administer the  
17 governor's finish line New Hampshire scholarship program with funds appropriated from the  
18 general court. The program shall provide tuition grants, after federal grants and other aid, for  
19 eligible students who have already completed 30 credits.

20 II. The program shall be open to any student attending an institution within the  
21 community college system who is over 25 years of age and is enrolled in a field which the

2 21-N:16 Governor's Scholarship Fund Established.

3 I. There is hereby established in the state treasury the governor's scholarship fund which

8 the plates, except for members of the governor's council whose plates shall have their council  
9 district numbers embossed on them, and members of the general court, whose plates shall have  
10 their house seat numbers or their senate district numbers embossed on them unless the president of  
11 the senate, for members of the senate, or the speaker of the house of representatives, for members  
12 of the house of representatives, shall designate a title for their plates. The president of the senate,  
13 or a designee, and the speaker of the house of representatives, or a designee, shall provide the  
14 director with input as needed on the cover plate design for members of the general court. The  
15 director shall not issue more than 2 sets of official cover plates to any person. Official cover plates  
16 may be attached only to vehicles registered in the name of the person issued the plates or the name

36 218 New Section; The Budget; Transmission to the Legislature; Changes to Statutory Law.  
37 Amend RSA 9 by inserting after section 2 the following new section:



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1           9:2-a Transmission to the Legislature; Changes to Statutory Law. Not later than February 15  
2 of the first year of each biennial legislative session, the governor shall transmit to the legislature a  
3 document to be known as the trailer bill containing any changes to statutory law deemed necessary  
4 for the ensuing biennium. This document shall be separate from the document known as the

8 223 Motor Vehicles; Drivers' Licenses; Real ID Compliant; Fee. Amend RSA 263:42, I to read  
9 as follows:

10 I. For each original driver's license and examination or driver's license renewal, other than  
11 for a commercial vehicle or motorcycle- **\$60 for a Real ID Act compliant license under RSA**  
12 **263:14-b or \$50 for each other license**; for each license issued under RSA 263:5-f- \$10; for each  
13 youth operator's license and examination- \$10 per year, not to exceed \$50; for each license issued to  
14 a nonresident alien for less than 5 years- \$10 per year or portion thereof; for each original  
15 commercial driver license and examination or commercial driver license renewal- \$60; for each  
16 commercial driver license reexamination in a one-year period- \$20; for each commercial vehicle  
17 endorsement, renewal of an endorsement, or removal of a restriction- \$10; for each special

33 The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not

35 230 Appropriation; Department of Health and Human Services; Inpatient Psychiatric  
36 Treatment Facility. There is hereby appropriated the sum of \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ending  
37 June 30, 2020, which shall be nonlapsing, to the department of health and human services for the

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1 purpose of obtaining and renovating a new treatment facility for children who are in need of acute  
2 inpatient psychiatric treatment. The plans for developing such facility shall be completed by  
3 December 31, 2019, and the facility shall be operational by December 31, 2020. The governor is  
4 authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not otherwise  
5 appropriated.

6 231 Appropriation; Department of Health and Human Services; New Hampshire Hospital  
7 Repurposing. There is hereby appropriated to the department of health and human services the  
8 sum of \$4,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020, which shall be nonlapsing, for the  
9 purpose of repurposing the children's unit at New Hampshire Hospital for adult beds. The plans for  
10 repurposing the unit shall be developed by the department in consultation with the advisory council  
11 on patients civilly committed to the secure psychiatric unit, established in RSA 622:52-a, and shall  
12 be completed by June 1, 2020. The unit shall be operational for adult patients by June 1, 2021. The  
13 governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any money in the treasury not  
14 otherwise appropriated.

15 232 Appropriation; Department of Health and Human Services; Transitional Housing Beds.  
16 There is hereby appropriated to the department of health and human services the sum of  
17 \$2,500,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020, which shall be nonlapsing, for the purpose of  
18 funding 20 new transitional housing beds for forensic patients and/or patients with complex  
19 behavioral health conditions including those transitioning from the New Hampshire hospital. The  
20 plans for constructing such beds shall be completed by January 1, 2020, and the beds shall be  
21 operational by June 1, 2021. The governor is authorized to draw a warrant for said sum out of any  
22 money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

23 233 Appropriation; Department of Health and Human Services; Patients Residing in Hospital  
24 Emergency Rooms. There is hereby appropriated to the department of health and human services  
25 the sum of \$1,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2019, which shall be nonlapsing, and shall  
26 be expended for the purpose of providing assistance to hospitals in addressing the immediate needs  
27 of involuntary emergency admissions patients currently residing in emergency rooms in hospitals  
28 further than 30 miles from an established New Hampshire mobile crisis team or a designated  
29 receiving facility; provided that no hospital shall receive more than \$100,000. The commissioner of  
30 the department of health and human services shall establish the application process for such funds.

33 234 Transfer of Funds for Operation of the Sununu Youth Services Center. Notwithstanding  
34 RSA 9:16-a and RSA 9:16-c, for the biennium ending June 30, 2021, prior approval of the fiscal  
35 committee of the general court shall be required for any transfer of funds required for the operation  
36 of the Sununu youth services center.

37 235 Medicaid Managed Care Program; Dental Benefits. Amend RSA 126-A:5, XIX(a) to read as

1 follows:

2           XIX.(a) The commissioner shall employ a managed care model for administering the  
3 Medicaid program and its enrollees to provide for managed care services for all Medicaid  
4 populations throughout New Hampshire consistent with the provisions of 42 U.S.C. *section* 1396u-  
5 2. Models for managed care may include, but not be limited to, a traditional capitated managed  
6 care organization contract, an administrative services organization, an accountable care  
7 organization, or a primary care case management model, or a combination thereof, offering the best  
8 value, quality assurance, and efficiency, maximizing the potential for savings, and presenting the  
9 most innovative approach compared to other externally administered models. The department shall  
10 present the opportunities of the various models or combination of models with a recommendation for  
11 the best managed care model for New Hampshire, no later than July 15, 2011, to the fiscal  
12 committee of the general court which shall consult with the oversight committee on health and  
13 human services. Services to be managed within the model shall include all mandatory Medicaid  
14 covered services and may include, but shall not be limited to, care coordination, utilization  
15 management, disease management, pharmacy benefit management, provider network management,  
16 quality management, and customer services. ~~[The model shall not include mandatory dental~~  
17 ~~services.]~~ The commissioner shall issue a 5-year request for proposals to enter into contracts with  
18 the vendors that demonstrate the greatest ability to satisfy the state's need for value, quality,  
19 efficiency, innovation, and savings. The request for proposals shall be released no later than  
20 October 15, 2011. The vendors of the managed care model or combination of models demonstrating  
21 the greatest ability to satisfy the state's need for value, quality, efficiency, innovation, and savings  
22 shall be selected no later than January 15, 2012 with final contracts submitted to the governor and  
23 council no later than March 15, 2012 unless this date is extended by the fiscal committee. After the  
24 bidding process, the commissioner shall establish a capitated rate based on the bids by the  
25 appropriate model for the contract that is full risk to the vendors. The capitated rate shall be  
26 broken down into rate cells for each population including, but not limited to, the persons eligible for  
27 temporary assistance to needy families (TANF), aid for the permanently and totally disabled  
28 (APTD), breast and cervical cancer program (BCCP), home care for children with severe disabilities  
29 (HC-CSD), and those residing in nursing facilities. The capitated rate shall be approved by the  
30 fiscal committee of the general court. The managed care model or models' selected vendors  
31 providing the Medicaid services shall establish medical homes and all Medicaid recipients shall  
32 receive their care through a medical home. In contracting for a managed care model and the  
33 various rate cells, the department shall ensure no reduction in the quality of care of services  
34 provided to enrollees in the managed care model and shall exercise all due diligence to maintain or  
35 increase the current level of quality of care provided. The target date for implementation of the  
36 contract is July 1, 2012. The commissioner may, in consultation with the fiscal committee, adopt  
37 rules, if necessary, to implement the provisions of this paragraph. The department shall seek, with

1 the approval of the fiscal committee, all necessary and appropriate waivers to implement the  
2 provisions of this paragraph.

3 236 New Subdivision; Child Abuse Specialized Medical Evaluation Program. Amend RSA 169-  
4 C by inserting after section 39-k the following new subdivision:

5 Child Abuse Specialized Medical Evaluation Program

6 169-C:39-1 Child Abuse Specialized Medical Evaluation Program Established. A child abuse  
7 specialized medical evaluation program is hereby established in the department. The program shall  
8 include the following elements:

9 I. Child protective service workers shall have on-call access, 24 hours a day and 7 days a  
10 week, to an experienced health care professional who is trained in and can advise on the  
11 standardized diagnostic methods, treatment, and disposition of suspected child sexual abuse and  
12 physical abuse.

13 II. Department nurses and child protective service workers performing screenings and  
14 assessments of reported cases of child abuse shall receive pre-service training in the standardized  
15 medical diagnostic methods, treatment, and disposition as well as periodic in-service training by  
16 health care providers experienced in child abuse and neglect.

17 III. Annually, a limited number of designated health care providers geographically  
18 distributed shall be trained in nationally recognized curricula to respond to initial presentations of  
19 child sexual abuse, physical abuse, and neglect.

20 IV. Health care professionals who participate in the training or are members of a  
21 multidisciplinary team, working with the department of health and human services or law  
22 enforcement, shall participate in periodic peer or expert reviews of their evaluations and undertake  
23 continuing education in the medical evaluation of child abuse and neglect according to professional  
24 standards.

25 V. The department shall contract with a health care provider with experience in child  
26 abuse and neglect to administer the program in collaboration with participating private and public  
27 entities.

28 VI. Reimbursement rates for health care providers who participate in the program shall  
29 reflect the average cost to deliver such services, including the participation in multidisciplinary  
30 team activities and associated court proceedings. The rates shall be periodically reviewed and, if  
31 necessary, revised.

32 VII. The commissioner of the department shall adopt rules, under RSA 541-A, relative to  
33 the medical evaluation program, training and continuing education requirements, and  
34 reimbursement rates.

35 237 Delinquent Children; Dispositional Hearing; Commitment of Minors. RSA 169-B:19, VI is  
36 repealed and reenacted to read as follows:

37 VI.(a) A minor committed to the youth development center pursuant to this section shall be

1 promptly evaluated by the center to determine whether a safe, therapeutic, and cost-effective  
2 placement may be made as an alternative to the youth development center. Such evaluation is not  
3 required if the minor has been committed for a serious violent offense as defined in RSA 169-B:31-c,  
4 II.

5 (b) If the commissioner determines that an alternative placement for a minor would be  
6 safe, therapeutic, and cost-effective, the commissioner may place the minor in a residential  
7 treatment facility that the commissioner has certified for the immediate transfer of committed  
8 minors. If the commissioner determines that an alternative placement for a minor would be safe,  
9 therapeutic, and cost-effective, but decides not to make an alternative placement, the commissioner  
10 shall notify the court within 5 business days of the decision to not pursue an alternative placement,  
11 along with the basis for the decision not to place the minor outside the youth development center.  
12 Within 2 business days of receiving notice, the court shall provide a copy of the notice to the parent  
13 or guardian of the minor and to the attorney who represented the minor at the time of the  
14 commitment to the youth development center.

15 (c) The commissioner shall notify the court of an alternative placement made pursuant  
16 to this paragraph within 5 business days of the placement. The commissioner shall notify the court  
17 of any change in placement to another facility made during the period of commitment. All such  
18 notices shall include a description of the basis for the change in placement, and shall be provided to  
19 the parent or guardian of the minor and to the attorney who represented the minor at the time of  
20 the commitment to the youth development center.

21 (d) The commissioner shall certify at least 2 facilities for the immediate transfer of  
22 committed minors pursuant to this paragraph. Only facilities which are eligible for Medicaid  
23 reimbursement may be certified for immediate transfers. The process for certification of residential  
24 treatment facilities under this subparagraph shall include consultation with the operators of  
25 existing facilities in the state about their physical and programmatic capacity, as well as the  
26 identification of any necessary enhancements in programming or rate structure so that the certified  
27 facilities are appropriate to receive minors immediately following their commitment to the youth  
28 development center.

29 (e) The commissioner shall notify the administrative justice of the circuit court and the  
30 fiscal committee of the general court if a facility is certified for alternative placements pursuant to  
31 this paragraph within 10 business days of the certification.

32 (f) The commissioner shall maximize the utilization of facilities other than the youth  
33 development center and reserve the use of the youth development center for the confinement of only  
34 those minors who are so dangerous to themselves or to the public that no other safe placement is  
35 available. The commissioner shall pursue the same objectives in complying with the requirements  
36 of all provisions of this chapter and the provisions of RSA 621.

37 238 Applicability. RSA 169-B:19, VI, as amended by section 237 of this act, shall apply to

7 240 New Section; Commission to Study School Funding. Amend RSA 193-E by inserting after  
8 section 2-d the following new section:

9 193-E:2-e Commission Established.

10 I. There is established a commission to study school funding.

11 II. The members of the commission shall be as follows:

12 (a) Four members of the house of representatives, appointed by the speaker of the house  
13 of representatives.

14 (b) Two members of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.

15 (c) Six members of the public, 3 of whom shall be appointed by the president of the  
16 senate and 3 of whom shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.

17 (d) One member appointed by the governor.

18 (e) Three members appointed by the chairperson of the commission pursuant to  
19 paragraph V.

20 III. Legislative members of the commission shall receive mileage at the legislative rate  
21 when attending to the duties of the commission.

22 IV. The commission shall:

23 (a) Review the education funding formula and make recommendations to ensure a  
24 uniform and equitable design for financing the cost of an adequate education for all public school  
25 students in the state.

26 (b) Determine whether the New Hampshire school funding formula complies with court  
27 decisions mandating the opportunity for an adequate education for all students, with a revenue  
28 source that is uniform across the state.

29 (c) Identify trends and disparities across the state in student performance in  
30 kindergarten through grade 12 based on current school funding options.

31 (d) Re-establish the baseline for the costs, programs, staffing, and facilities needed to  
32 provide the opportunity for an adequate education.

33 (e) Act as an independent commission.

34 (f) Consider other policy issues as the committee deems necessary. The commission  
35 may consult with outside resources and state agencies, including but not limited to the department  
36 of education, the department of revenue administration, and the legislative budget office.

37 V. The members of the study commission shall elect a chairperson from among the



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1 members. The chairperson shall appoint 3 individuals to be members of the commission. The first  
2 meeting of the commission shall be called by the first-named house member. The first meeting of  
3 the commission shall be held within 60 days of the effective date of this section. Eight members of

27 (b) Partnerships, limited liability companies, and associations, the beneficial interest in  
28 which is not represented by transferable shares, whose gross interest [~~and~~], ***gross*** dividend, [~~income~~  
29 ~~from all sources~~] ***and capital gain income, as defined in RSA 77:4***, exceeds [~~\$2,400~~] ***\$5,000***  
30 during the taxable year, but not including a qualified investment company as defined in RSA 77-  
31 A:1, XXI, or a trust comprising a part of an employee benefit plan, as defined in the Employee  
32 Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, section 3.

33 (c) Executors deriving their appointment from a court of this state whose gross interest  
34 [~~and~~], ***gross*** dividend, [~~income from all sources~~] ***and capital gain income, as defined in***  
35 ***RSA 77:4***, exceeds [~~\$2,400~~] ***\$5,000*** during the taxable year.

36 243 Taxation of Incomes; What Taxable. Amend RSA 77:4, IV and V to read as follows:

AMENDED ANALYSIS

1. Repeals 2017,155:7, which directed the commissioner of administrative services to eliminate appropriations to class 027 transfers to OIT in all agencies and departments.
2. Establishes the unclassified position of director of plant and property within the department of administrative services.
3. Converts managers in the department of administrative services to directors, and renames divisions and units accordingly.
4. Authorizes the department of administrative services to consolidate state agency human resources, payroll, and business processing functions.
5. Provides that cost sharing and plan design for unrepresented active state employees who participate in the health plans offered by the state shall be the same as those for individuals covered by the collective bargaining agreement.
6. Extends the state heating systems savings account.
7. Establishes an additional surplus fund within the department of administrative services.
8. Establishes the building maintenance fund within the department of administrative services and assesses charge to state agencies.
9. Limits the number of judges on the superior court and the number of full time judges on the circuit court for the biennium ending June 30, 2021.
10. Permits the supreme court to transfer funds among judicial branch accounts.
11. Provides the department of corrections with additional transfer authority for the biennium ending June 30, 2021 and establishes the cost of care reimbursement account and the unclassified position of director of nursing in the department of corrections.
12. Provides that chartered school lease aid shall not exceed more than \$30,000 per school in any fiscal year.
13. Suspends the senior volunteer grant program and congregate services for the biennium ending June 30, 2021.
14. Directs the department of health and human services to raise the income eligibility for elderly and adult clients under the social services block grant program each January.
15. Increases the limit for county reimbursements under RSA 167:18-a.
16. Extends the prospective repeal for eligibility of state mental health services under 2011, 209:6, I.
17. Suspends direct and indirect graduate medical education payments to hospitals for the biennium ending June 30, 2021.
18. Suspends catastrophic aid to hospitals for the biennium ending June 30, 2021.

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19. Makes an appropriation the department of safety, division of fire standards and training and emergency medical services, for the purpose of providing grants to local firefighters for medical examinations conducted pursuant to RSA 281-A:17.

20. Requires the commissioner of the department of health and human services to make quarterly reports to the governor, speaker of the house of representatives, and president of the senate on the status of estimated Medicaid payments in relation to actual costs.

21. Permits the department of health and human services to fill unfunded positions during the biennium ending June 30, 2021.

22. Repeals RSA 151-E:18, relative to presumptive eligibility for nursing services.

23. Establishes certain revolving funds within the department of health and human services.

24. Directs that the Laconia state school trust shall be dissolved upon final distribution of the funds pursuant to court order.

25. Establishes a committee to study outdated non-regulatory boards.

34. Adds a representative from the New Hampshire Hospital Association and a representative from the state's faith-based community to the governor's commission on alcohol and drug abuse prevention, treatment, and recovery.

35. Establishes a system of paid family and medical leave insurance.

36. Modifies the provision of civil legal services funds for low-income persons to New Hampshire legal assistance and eliminates the dedicated civil services legal fund.

37. Clarifies the health facilities licensure moratorium.

38. Authorizes sports betting in New Hampshire and establishes a council for responsible gambling.

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39. Requires Keno revenue to be deposited in the education trust fund.
40. Defines and regulates the sale of electronic cigarettes and e-cigarettes.
41. Modifies the duties of the board of veterinary medicine.
42. Modifies the procedure for certified application prepayers for minimum environmental impact projects.

48. Authorizes the commissioner of the department of transportation to recommend the bulk disposal of real estate purchased with state or federal highway funds or both, or turnpike funds.
49. Repeals the Maine-New Hampshire interstate bridge authority.
50. Repeals witness fees for witnesses summoned before certain boards and commissions.
51. Amends the granite workforce program.
52. Exempts certain accounting units within the department of cultural and natural resources from transfer restrictions.
53. Requires payment of any transaction costs assessed for credit card payments on motor vehicle fines to be paid out of the fine amount which is credited to the highway fund.

61. Establishes the community development fund for New Hampshire, which shall be administered by the community development finance authority, and makes an appropriation to the fund.
62. Makes appropriations to the department of environmental services for the purpose of funding state aid grant programs.
63. Establishes victim/witness specialist positions in the department of justice.
64. Establishes an unclassified, full-time elections attorney position within the department of justice.
65. Permits the department of natural and cultural resources to suspend curatorial responsibilities for the biennium ending June 30, 2021.
66. Allows for statewide public boat access funds to be used for payment of the cost of bonds for the Mount Sunapee state park beach boat ramp project of the department of natural and cultural resources.
67. Makes an appropriation to the department of natural and cultural resources for redevelopment and improvement projects at the Fort Stark historic site.
68. Clarifies the qualifications of the director of the division of archives and records management.
69. Modifies the election fund to include monies received by the state pursuant to the 2018 Election Reform Program, and expands the list of authorized uses of monies deposited into the fund.
70. Authorizes an appropriation of money to the department of state for the purpose of implementing the 2018 Election Reform Program authorized by the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2018, Public Law 115-141.
71. Makes changes to unemployment compensation contribution rates.
72. Transfers the job training program for economic growth from the department of business and economic affairs to the department of employment security.
73. Makes an appropriation to the housing finance authority for affordable housing.
74. Establishes a separate account for funds acquired to provide financial and technical assistance associated with agricultural restricted covenants, funding developmental rights, or for farmland preservation and makes an appropriation therefor.
75. Suspends the position of state demographer for the biennium.
76. Changes the number of review appraisers the staff of the board of tax and land appeals is required to have.
77. Extends the Coos county job creation tax credit until 2027.

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78. Establishes the rates of the business profits tax and the business enterprise tax for taxpayer tax years ending on or after December 31, 2019 and for subsequent tax years, and repeals rate reductions effective in 2021.

79. Amends the authorized uses of the education trust fund.

80. Directs the governor to submit a document to be known as the trailer bill to the legislature as part of the budget process and clarifies that the document shall not be considered a budget bill under the New Hampshire constitution.

81. Establishes the position of deputy director of administration in the department of safety, division of administration.

82. Provides that the current assistant director of the division of fire standards and training and emergency medical services, department of safety, shall be considered to have been properly enrolled as a member in group II of the New Hampshire retirement system as of his original date of hire.

83. Raises the fee for email or other computer-generated motor vehicle record requests by insurance companies or other authorized agents.

84. Establishes the fee for a Real ID Act compliant driver's license.

85. Permits the department of transportation to access certain federal funding for the purpose of completing the project development phase of the capital corridor rail project in the 2019-2028 Ten Year Transportation Improvement Plan and permits the department of transportation to use toll credits for this project.

86. Makes an appropriation to the department of transportation for the purpose of demolition and environmental mitigation of structures on state-owned property.

87. Exempts certain rules on the Medicaid rate of reimbursement methodology for nursing facilities from the administrative procedures act, RSA 541-A.

88. Clarifies disbursements of community benefit contributions from the alcohol abuse prevention and treatment fund.

89. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for rate increases and construction of designated receiving facility beds.

90. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for the purpose of obtaining and renovating a new treatment facility for children in need of inpatient psychiatric treatment.

91. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for the purpose of repurposing the children's unit of New Hampshire hospital for adult beds.

92. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for the purpose of constructing transitional housing beds.

93. Makes an appropriation to the department of health and human services for the purpose of providing assistance to hospitals in addressing the needs of certain patients residing in emergency rooms.

94. Requires fiscal committee approval for any transfer of funds required for operation of the

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Sununu youth services center.

95. Requires the Medicaid managed care program to provide dental benefits to covered persons beginning in 2021.

96. Establishes a child abuse specialized medical evaluation program in the department of health and human services.

97. Requires evaluation of a minor committed to the youth development center to determine whether an alternative placement in a safe, therapeutic, and cost-effective, residential treatment facility is feasible.

98. Provides for the availability of certain federal family planning funds.

99. Establishes a commission to study school funding.

100. Extends the interest and dividends tax to capital gains and increases exemptions for the tax.

101. Requires a portion of interest and dividend and capital gains tax revenues to be credited to the education trust fund.

102. Calculates kindergarten pupils as full day attendance for the purpose of adequate education grants.

103. Repeals distribution of kindergarten grants based on Keno revenue.

104. Establishes fiscal capacity disparity aid to municipalities based on equalized valuation per pupil.

105. Provides additional aid to municipalities based on the percentage of pupils eligible to receive a free or reduced-price meal.

106. Requires school districts to report on the use of adequate education grant funds.

107. Provides stabilization grants to municipalities in fiscal year 2020 and repeals the grants in fiscal year 2021 and thereafter.

108. Provides that any budget surplus in excess of \$5,000,000 at the close of the biennium ending June 30, 2019, shall not be deposited in the revenue stabilization reserve account but shall remain in the general fund.
