I. Extends the deadlines of the legislative commission on the interdisciplinary primary care workforce issues.

II. Makes clarifying amendments to the nurse practice act statute.

III. Establishes the position of and regulation of community health workers.

IV. Provides directives to the department of health and human services.

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Four

AN ACT

relative to the health care workforce.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

1 1 Purpose and Findings.

I. The state of New Hampshire shall address the health care workforce shortage through establishing programs designed to incentivize students to seek employment in health care and remain in New Hampshire upon graduation; removing career-advancement barriers for our dedicated direct care providers; and equipping health care organizations with the tools necessary to secure skilled clinicians. Voluntary certification of community health workers will aid in addressing the health care workforce shortage.

8 II. Case managers play a critical role in helping individuals access needed medical, social, 9 educational, and other services, and case managers' ability to serve their clients must be preserved.

2 Commission on the Interdisciplinary Primary Care Workforce Issues; Reports. Amend RSA
 126-T:4 to read as follows:

12 126-T:4 Reports. The commission shall make an interim report on November 1, [2020] 2026 13 which shall focus on the status of the New Hampshire state loan repayment program and the New 14 Hampshire division of public health service's health professions survey, and a final report on 15 November 1, [2024] 2029, including its findings and any recommendations for proposed legislation, 16 to the speaker of the house of representatives, the president of the senate, the governor, the 17 oversight committee on health and human services, and the chairpersons of the senate and house 18 executive departments and administration committees.

Commission on the Interdisciplinary Primary Care Workforce Issues Extended. Amend 2010,
114:4, I as amended by 2015, 238:4; 2018, 248:3; and 2020, 17:7 to read as follows:

4 Nurse Practice Act; Certificate of Medication Administration for Licensed Nursing Assistants.
 Amend RSA 326-B:27, I to read as follows:

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I. The board may issue a certificate of medication administration to a current LNA who:

(a) Has participated in and completed a board-approved medication administration
 education program;

6	326-N:1 Definitions.					
7	I. "Applicant" means an individual applying to be certified or recertified as a community					
8	health worker.					
9	II. "Certificate" means the document issued by the office of professional licensure and					
10	certification to qualified applicants for certification as community health workers.					
11	III. "Certification" means the voluntary process by which the office of professional licensure					
12	and certification grants recognition and use of a credential to individuals who are eligible to practice					
13	as certified community health workers.					
14	IV. "Certified community health worker" means a community health worker to whom the					
15	office of professional licensure and certification has issued a certificate to practice as a certified					
16	community health worker.					
17	V. "Commissioner" means the commissioner of the department of health and human

15	I. The executive director shall, in consultation with the New Hampshire area health

19	(1) Minimum and continuing education;
20	(2) Training;
21	(3) Experience; and

6	326-N:4 Application; Certification Fees; Issuance of Certification; Applicants from Other States.
7	I. Upon approval by the executive director, the executive director shall issue a certification
8	to any person who files an application for such certification within 30 days after the filing of such
9	application.
10	II. Every application for community health worker certification shall be accompanied by a
11	non-refundable registration fee.
12	III. Certification shall be renewed biannually on or before June 30 upon payment of the
13	renewal fee.
14	IV. A certified community health worker shall conspicuously display such certification in the
15	principal place of business for which the certification is issued.
16	V. The executive director may issue a certification to any applicant who is licensed or
17	certified in any other state provided the other state's requirements are substantially equivalent to or
18	more stringent than those of this state. An applicant whose state licensure or certification meets the
19	requirements set forth in this paragraph shall be deemed able to work as a certified community
20	health worker in this state not more than 60 days after the application is received by the executive
21	director pending final approval or denial for other reason by the executive director.
22	326-N:5 Suspension; Revocation or Refusal to Issue Certification. The executive director may
23	deny the application for a certified community health worker and may suspend or revoke the
24	certification issued pursuant to this chapter or refuse to issue a renewal thereof if it is determined
25	after hearing that such applicant or registrant:
26	I. Has made a material false statement or concealed a material fact in connection with his or
27	her application for certification;
28	II. Has had a certificate of registration issued under this chapter revoked or suspended
29	previously;
30	III. Has been found guilty of fraud or fraudulent practices after prosecution;
31	IV. Has failed to comply with any other provision of this chapter or any rules promulgated
32	by the executive director.
33	326-N:6 Use of Certified Community Health Worker Designation; Exemptions.
34	I. In order to use the title "certified community health worker", the initials "CCHW", or
35	other designation indicating that the individual is a certified community health worker, an
36	individual shall be certified pursuant to the provisions of the RSA 326-N:4.

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II. To ensure compliance with the provisions of this chapter or any rule that the executive director has adopted and promulgated pursuant to this chapter, the office of professional licensure and certification may issue cease-and-desist orders to persons violating the provisions of this chapter.

5 III. A community health worker shall engage only in those activities authorized pursuant to 6 this chapter and by rules adopted pursuant to this chapter. While engaging in practice as a 7 community health worker, an individual shall not engage in or perform any act or service for which 8 another professional certificate, license, or other legal authority is required.

9 IV. Certification as a community health worker is voluntary. Nothing in this section shall 10 be construed as requiring community health workers to be certified for purposes of employment. 11 Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent or restrict the practice, service, or activities of 12any individual simultaneously certified as a community health worker and licensed, certified, 13registered, or otherwise legally authorized in the state to engage in the practice of another profession 14if that individual does not, while engaged in the authorized practice of another profession, use any name, title, the initials "CCHW", or other designation indicating that the individual is a certified 1516community health worker.

17 326-N:7 Telemedicine. Certified community health workers shall be permitted to provide18 services through the use of telemedicine.

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326-N:8 Procedure for Complaints; Hearings; Judicial Review.

20I. No certification shall be suspended or revoked until after a hearing before the executive director, which shall be held in accordance with RSA 541-A, and upon written notice mailed to the 2122registrant by certified or registered mail. However, when a notice of hearing is mailed to a 23registrant at the address shown in the records of the department and such a registrant fails to 24attend such hearing, the executive director may suspend his or her registration without a hearing 25pending his or her attendance at such hearing. Upon the denial of an application for a certificate of 26registration, the executive director shall grant a hearing to an applicant upon receipt of a request for 27a hearing made within 30 days after the applicant is notified of denial. The executive director shall 28have the power to require the attendance of witnesses and issue subpoenas duces tecum in the 29conduct of such hearing. If a certification is revoked or suspended or an application is denied, no 30 such certification shall be issued to such former registrant or applicant for at least 6 months, or 31thereafter except at the discretion of the executive director. The applicant may be heard in person or 32by counsel. The executive director shall notify the applicant of the time and place of the hearing. 33The executive director shall have the power to subpoena any person in this state, or document, 34record, or other relevant evidence, and to administer an oath to and take the testimony of any such 35person or to cause his deposition to be taken.

36 II. Appeals from an order of suspension or revocation or a denial of an application of 37 certification shall be made pursuant to the provisions of RSA 541.

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7 Department of Health and Human Services; Division of Public Health Services; Department
 2 Directives.

I. The department of health and human services, division of public health services, may contract with community-based organizations, including community health centers and family resource centers, to deploy and sustain community health workers that connect families and patients with needed health and supportive services.

II. The department may use federal funds where available and general funds within the
department's existing budget upon approval of the fiscal committee to sustain the work of
community health workers through the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025.

10 III. The department shall develop a brief plan that articulates potential funding alternatives11 if federal funding is no longer available.

12 IV. The department shall develop a plan to be part of its budget submission in 2025 to fund 13 community health workers at community based organizations including community health centers 14 and family resource centers.

15 8 Medicaid Reimbursement for Certified Community Health Workers; State Plan Amendment. 16 The commissioner of the department of health and human services shall submit a Title XIX 17 Medicaid state plan amendment to the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to allow 18 for reimbursement for the services provided by certified community health workers. Upon approval 19 of the state plan amendment, and as of the effective date of the state plan amendment, the 20 department shall reimburse for services provided by certified community health workers.

21 9 Effective Date.

I. Section 6 of this act shall take effect January 1, 2025.

23 II. The remainder of this act shall take effect upon its passage.

METHODOLOGY:

This bill establishes various new programs and disciplines in order to address health care workforce shortages in the State. In particular, the bill:

- Extends the work of the Commission on the Interdisciplinary Primary Care Workforce until 2029;
- Allows the Board of Nursing to issue a certificate of medication administration to current Licensed Nursing Assistants (LNA) who meet certain criteria specified in the bill;
- Creates a new chapter (RSA 326-N) establishing and regulating community health workers;
- Allows the Division of Public Health Services within the Department of Health and Human Services to contract with community-based organizations to connect individuals and families with proper supports to manage health care; and
- Requires the Department of Health and Human Services to submit a Title XIX Medicaid state plan amendment to allow for reimbursement of services provided by certified community health workers.

As amended, the bill does not include an appropriation, but rather directs the Department of Health and Human Services to use federal funds where available, as well as general funds within the Department's existing budget (with the approval of the Fiscal Committee) to sustain the work of community mental health workers through the end of FY25. The Department anticipates that approximately \$4.2 million of federal funds and general funds will be available to use for these purposes.

The Office of Professional Licensure and Certification (OPLC) states that the bill creates obligations and grants authority to the OPLC, in cooperation with the NH area health education centers, to draft rules for a new occupational certification and creates obligations for the executive director to establish fees, create standards of investigations, and procedures for disciplinary action. There may be additional administrative costs to the OPLC in the form of OPLC rule promulgation and legal support. There may also be costs associated with investigation and enforcement. The OPLC is unable to estimate these costs.

The OPLC states that it is unable to determine the number of applicants for the voluntary certification established by the bill. The OPLC assumes the certification fee would be \$155.00 for two years and estimates 30 individuals will choose to be certified in year one and this number will increase each year thereafter. OPLC assumes the increase in revenue will be as follows:

- FY 2024: Not in effect
- FY 2025: \$4,650 (30 new licenses * \$155)
- FY 2026: \$4,650 (30 new licenses * \$155)
- FY 2027: \$9,300 (30 new licenses plus 30 renewals * \$155)
