## SENATE BILL 207

- AN ACT establishing a committee to study licensure of mental health professionals and relative to mental health critical incident intervention and management.

II. Adds a new definition for "peer support group" to emergency medical and trauma services and critical incident intervention and management.

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

## In the Year of Our Lord Two Thousand Twenty Three

# AN ACT establishing a committee to study licensure of mental health professionals and relative to mental health critical incident intervention and management.

Be it Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court convened:

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1	1 Legislative Findings. The general court finds that:
2	I. New Hampshire has a shortage of qualified mental health professionals.
3	II. New Hampshire competes with neighboring states to attract qualified mental health
4	professionals.
<b>5</b>	III. Licensure requirements and licensure processes may impact the mental health
6	workforce in New Hampshire.
$\overline{7}$	2 Committee Established. There is established a committee to study and make
8	recommendations relative to licensure of mental health professions under the board of licensing for
9	alcohol and other drug use professionals, board of medicine, board of mental health practice, board of
10	nursing, and board of psychology.
11	3 Membership and Compensation.
12	I. The members of the committee shall be as follows:
13	(a) One member of the senate, appointed by the president of the senate.
14	(b) Three members of the house of representatives, at least one of whom shall be from
15	the executive departments and administration committee and at least one of whom shall be from the
16	health, human services, and elderly affairs committee, appointed by the speaker of the house of
17	representatives.
18	II. Members of the committee shall receive mileage at the legislative rate when attending to
19	the duties of the committee.
20	4 Duties. The committee shall:
21	I. Review licensure criteria for mental health professionals regulated by the board of
22	licensing for alcohol and other drug use professionals, board of medicine, board of mental health
23	practice, board of nursing, and board of psychologists, including how such criteria relates to
24	requirements in neighboring states.
25	II. Review the licensure processes of the office of professional licensure and certification as it
26	relates to mental health professionals, including how the statutory and regulatory framework may
27	impact the timely and efficient licensure of qualified applicants.
28	III. Identify and make recommendations for joining available licensure compacts or adopting
29	an endorsement model regarding mental health professionals.

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1 IV. Explore licensure barriers to attracting qualified mental health professionals to New 2 Hampshire.

V. Make recommendations, if necessary, for changes to licensure regarding the board of licensing for alcohol and other drug use professionals, board of medicine, board of mental health practice, board of nursing, and board of psychologists, including how such criteria relates to requirements in neighboring states.

VI. Seek input from state agencies and boards, councils, and commissions within the office,
stakeholders, and any other person or entity the committee deems relevant to its study.

9 VII. Consider whether elements of 2020 Emergency Orders 8, 15, and 18 have potential to 10 alleviate the challenges with mental health licensure if incorporated into statute, where not already 11 accomplished.

5 Chairperson; Quorum. The members of the study committee shall elect a chairperson from among the members. The first meeting of the committee shall be called by the senate member. The first meeting of the committee shall be held within 45 days of the effective date of this section. Three members of the committee shall constitute a quorum.

16 6 Report. The committee shall report its findings and any recommendations for proposed 17 legislation to the president of the senate, the speaker of the house of representatives, the senate 18 clerk, the house clerk, the governor, and the state library on or before November 1, 2023.

19 7 Emergency Medical and Trauma Services; Critical Incident Intervention and Management.
 20 Amend RSA 153-A:17-a, I(e) - III(b) to read as follows:

(e) "Critical incident stress management team" or "team" means the group of one or more trained volunteers, including members of peer support groups organized by a unit of state, local, [or] county government, or members of a union of emergency response/public safety workers as defined by RSA 281-A:2, V-c who offer critical incident stress management, [and] crisis intervention or peer support services following a critical incident or long term or continued, debilitating stress being experienced by emergency services providers and affecting them or their family situation.

(f) (1) "Peer Support Group" means the group of one or more trained volunteers, organized by a unit of state, local, county government or employee organization that can recognize common behavioral health issues, provide support services, and serve as a bridge to community resources or behavioral health treatment when indicated.

32 [(f)(1)] (2) "Critical incident stress management team member" or "team member" 33 means an emergency services provider, including any law enforcement officer, sheriff or deputy 34 sheriff, state police officer, civilian law enforcement employee, firefighter, civilian fire department 35 employee, emergency medical personnel, telecommunicators, and local dispatchers specially trained 36 to provide critical incident stress management, [and] crisis intervention or peer support services as 37 a member of an organized and registered team.

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[(2)] (3) In this subparagraph:

2 (A) "Telecommunicator" means an employee of the department of safety, division 3 of emergency services and communications who is responsible for receiving at the public safety 4 answering point telephone calls made to E911 and transferring or relaying such calls to public or 5 private safety agencies.

6 (B) "Local dispatcher" means a person who determines the location, status, and 7 assistance required by callers and walk-in customers for public safety services and dispatches the 8 appropriate police, fire, ambulance, or other units to provide needed emergency services at the state, 9 city, town, or private emergency services level.

10 II.(a) Team members shall undergo and sustain certification standards set forth in 11 guidelines established by the International Critical Incident Stress Foundation (ICISF) approved by 12 the commissioner of the department of safety, or a similar organization for which the commissioner 13 shall not unreasonably withhold approval. The team shall be registered with ICISF, or a similar 14 organization, and maintain training standards to date as required.

15 (b) All critical incident stress management team members or peer support group 16 members, sworn or civilian, shall be designated by the police chief, sheriff, director of the division of 17 state police, fire chief, or director of the division of emergency services and communications, or head 18 of an employee organization.

19III.(a) Any information divulged to the team, [or a] team member or peer support group 20member, during the provision of critical incident stress management, [and] crisis intervention or 21*peer support* services shall be kept confidential and shall not be disclosed to a third party or in a 22criminal, civil, or administrative proceeding. Records kept by critical incident stress management 23team members or peer support group are not subject to subpoena, discovery, or introduction into 24evidence in a criminal, civil, or administrative action. Except as provided in subparagraph (c), no 25person, whether critical incident stress management team member, [or] team leader or peer 26support group member providing or receiving critical incident stress management, [and] crisis 27intervention or peer support services, shall be required to testify or divulge any information 28obtained solely through such crisis intervention.

(b) The purpose of this section is to provide a consistent framework for the operation of critical incident stress management teams, *peer support groups*, and their members. In any civil action against any individual, agency, or government entity, including the state of New Hampshire, arising out of the conduct of a member of such team, this section is not intended and shall not be admissible to establish negligence in any instance where requirements herein are higher than the standard of care that would otherwise have been applicable in such action under state law.

36 I. Section 7 of this act shall take effect 60 days after its passage.

37 II. The remainder of this act shall take effect upon its passage.
