Wednesday, January 6, 2021

The House assembled at 11:00 a.m. and was called to order by the House Clerk, Paul C. Smith.

Prayer was offered by Rabbi Berel Slavaticki of the University of New Hampshire and Seacoast Chabad Jewish Center in Durham.

Dear God, we stand before You this morning, to pray that Your wisdom rest upon us, and that You lead us in making the right decisions. And we pray to find the inspiration within ourselves to make the decisions that are not just self-serving, but rather we should act in a way that brings Your goodness and light to all those we come in contact with. There is a fascinating human weakness called "The Bystander Affect." This is a condition where we find ourselves among a group and suddenly, we follow like everyone else instead of doing what we know needs to be done. You can watch several videos on YouTube where actors lying on busy streets are ignored by hundreds of people walking by, or a girl being kidnapped by a man she screams is not my father, and yet each bystander simply melts into the group and instead of stopping to help, they do nothing! After the famous killing of Kitty Genovese in 1964 where many heard her cries for help but did nothing, an experiment was done in a university where students were engaged in a discussion via an intercom. When the students were led to believe that they were the only people on the call and they heard the other participant begin to choke, then gasp and call for help as if undergoing a seizure, over 90% of the time the student rushed to the others aid within 90 seconds. But when three people were on the call, no one moved. This is called diffusion of responsibility. As elected officials, and as people constantly in the public eye, we are most prone to this. We want our constituents to be happy with us. We want to remain popular. But as role-models and community leaders we need to be the ones to fight the trend and do what we know is right, no matter what others think or say. So together, let us lift our eyes to our Creator, and ask him to not only grant us wisdom and clarity, but God, we ask You for the blessing of strength and courage, to do what we know is proper in Your eyes, regardless of what those around us are doing. Make us to be leaders in Your image. Let us say, Amen.

**WHEREAS**, we learned with profound sorrow that Representative Richard W. Hinch passed away a week after being elected Speaker of the New Hampshire House of Representatives; and

**WHEREAS**, a dedicated patriot, Richard W. Hinch proudly and honorably served his nation in the United States Navy and always had a US Navy lapel pin on whatever jacket he may be wearing; and

**WHEREAS**, "Dick" Hinch was recently elected to his seventh term in the New Hampshire House, representing the town of Merrimack, a community he profoundly loved and served in various roles, including as a Selectman, Budget Committee Member, and Chair of the Public Library Development Committee; and

**WHEREAS**, "Dick" Hinch was a friend, colleague, and mentor to many members in the House of Representatives over his twelve years in the State House, often holding court in the cafeteria enjoying breakfast with members from across the political spectrum; and

**WHEREAS**, "Dick" Hinch had an infectious laugh, was always quick to offer a hug, and even on the most difficult days where partisanship was prevalent, would seek to make his opponents smile and suggest things were "more betterer" leaving it on the floor; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED**, by the House of Representatives in Regular Session convened, Richard W. Hinch be granted the highest praise and accolades and our profound thanks for his service to his country, the state, and the town he called home for many years, and, be it further

### ADOPTION OF GROUND RULES FOR ELECTION

Reps. Packard and Cushing moved the adoption of the following ground rules for election:

The rules of these elections shall be the rules of the 2021 New Hampshire House of Representatives, subject to the following ground rules:

Only duly sworn members of the House shall be eligible to participate and vote. Access to the floor shall be limited to members, and such other officers and assistants as may be required by the Clerk and Sergeant-at-Arms. The Clerk will prepare a checklist of those present and qualified to vote. Election of candidates will be by majority vote of those present and voting. If more than two candidates are standing for an office, and if there is no majority vote, there will be no elimination of the low candidate after any ballot. All candidates will remain in the running unless they withdraw of their own volition. Balloting shall continue until a Speaker is elected. If there is no candidate with a majority of votes, there shall be a 20-minute recess after the announcement of the results. On each ballot, the Clerk will have printed, in alphabetical order, the name of any candidates, who prior to the opening of the session, informed the Clerk of their candidacies. There will be one blank line for write-in candidates. First ballot nominating and seconding speeches will be limited to 15 minutes for each candidate. Subsequent speeches shall be limited to 3 minutes per candidate. Candidates who desire to concede shall be limited to 3 minutes per candidate. Candidates who desire to concede or withdraw shall speak first. No other limitations will apply to these speeches. On a division vote, with 344 members having voted in the affirmative, and 8 in the negative, the ground rules for election were adopted.

### ELECTION OF HOUSE SPEAKER

The Chair declared that nominations for Speaker were in order.

Rep. Espitia placed the name of Robert Renny Cushing in nomination for Speaker and addressed the House. Rep. DiLorenzo seconded the nomination and addressed the House. Rep. Cushing accepted the nomination and addressed the House.

Rep. Steven Smith placed the name of Sherman Packard in nomination for Speaker and addressed the House. Rep. Sanborn seconded the nomination and addressed the House. Rep. Packard accepted the nomination and addressed the House.

The Chair declared nominations closed.

Of the 357 votes cast, 179 votes were needed for election. Rep. Cushing received 150 votes and Rep. Sherman Packard received 202 votes. There were 4 scatter votes and 1 vote for Rep. Shurtleff. The Chair declared Rep. Packard the duly-elected Speaker of the House for the 2021-2022 biennium.

The Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms escorted Speaker Packard to the rostrum. The Speaker addressed the House.

**SENATE MESSAGE**

Mister Speaker: The Senate has adopted the Secretary of State's report canvassing the votes for Governor and Executive Council.

**CLERK'S NOTE**

On the session day of January 6, the House utilized a voting device system whereby members entered their votes via keypad and were recorded utilizing a radio frequency based receiver. Unfortunately, through circumstances beyond the control of staff and the system, some votes were not captured for a variety of reasons, including interference from other electronic devices, vehicles acting as Faraday shields, and the like. Following the session, members notified the Clerk of missed votes and their preferences are entered in this Journal at the conclusion of recorded votes.

Reps. Osborne and Cushing moved the adoption of an amendment to House Rule 65, as proposed by the Rules Committee and as printed in the House Calendar.

**AMENDMENT TO HOUSE RULES****Amend House Rule 65 by replacing it with the following:**

On a division vote, with 323 members having voted in the affirmative, and 10 in the negative, the amendment to House Rules was adopted.

Reps. Osborne and Cushing moved the adoption of an amendment to House Rules 10, 57(b) 3 & 4, 64(d), 111, to change the reference of Mason's Manual, as proposed by the Rules Committee and as printed in the House Calendar.

#### AMENDMENT TO HOUSE RULES

10. Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure as parliamentary guide. In all cases not provided for by the Constitution, House Rules or Joint Rules, *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*, 2020 Edition, shall be the parliamentary guide.

57. (b) 3. Personal privilege in accordance with *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*, Sec. 220-226, 2020 edition. 57. (b) 4. Unanimous consent in accordance with *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*, Sec. 537, 2020 edition. 64. (d) Adopted parliamentary manual (*Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*, 2020 edition).

111. Back-Up Rules. In such cases where New Hampshire House Committee rules are silent, *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedures*, 2020 Edition, shall be the parliamentary guide.

Rep. Osborne spoke in favor.

On a division vote, with 316 members having voted in the affirmative, and 4 in the negative, the amendment to House Rules was adopted.

Reps. Osborne and Cushing moved the adoption of an amendment to House Rule 49 by adding new subparagraph 1, as proposed by the Rules Committee, and as printed in the House Calendar.

#### AMENDMENT TO HOUSE RULES

##### **Amend House Rule 49 by adding new subparagraph 1:**

49. (l) Pursuant to House Rule 36 (g), no Committee of Conference report shall be adopted which extends a deadline of a study committee beyond November 1 of the second-year session without a 2/3 affirmative vote of the House. Rep. Sanborn spoke in favor.

On a division vote, with 328 members having voted in the affirmative, and 4 in the negative, the amendment to House Rules was adopted.

Reps. Osborne and Cushing moved the adoption of an amendment to House Rule 67 by adding the following new House Rule 67, as proposed by the Rules Committee, and as printed in the House Calendar.

#### AMENDMENT TO HOUSE RULES

##### **Amend House Rules by adding the following new House Rule 67:**

67. Emergency Rules for Covid 19 Pandemic. The addition of the following rules is to apply during the Pandemic and subsequent state of emergency in the State of New Hampshire. These rules shall repeal at such a time as the state of emergency is lifted or expires

a) Notwithstanding House Rule 30, the Speaker is authorized to combine two or more committees for the purposes of working jointly on the disposition of bills.

b) Notwithstanding House Rule 43, bills may be heard concurrently in a public hearing.

c) Notwithstanding House Rule 65, deadlines may be altered by the Speaker of the House, in an effort to thwart the spread of Covid 19, after discussion with the majority and minority leaders, and public health officials. All changes to deadlines will be noticed in a timely manner in the House Calendar and on the General Court website.

d) Notwithstanding House Rules 31, 105 and 106, quorums present shall include a quorum of a committee meeting virtually and committee rooms shall be defined virtually.

e) Notwithstanding House Rule 110 and RSA 91-A:2, II, where a committee is meeting in person for executive session, the public may watch and observe the meeting remotely.

f) Notwithstanding the provisions of Rule 65, the deadline for amending House Rules by a simple majority shall be extended to the next session following the January 6, 2021 session.

#### MOTION TO DIVIDE

Rep. Spillane moved that the Amendment to House Rule adding new House Rule 67 be divided.

Rep. Spillane spoke in favor.

On a division vote, with 155 members having voted in the affirmative, and 183 in the negative, the motion failed.

The question now being adoption of the Amendment to House Rule 67. Rep.

Steven Smith spoke in favor.

Rep. Espitia requested a roll call; sufficiently seconded.

Each request shall be accompanied by sufficient information necessary for drafting. This deadline shall not apply to house resolutions that do not propose policy positions.

100. (s) If a committee chairman imposes a time limit for committee testimony, it must be applied equally to every speaker. To the extent possible, the committee chairman shall recognize speakers testifying in alternating fashion during each hearing. If this process cannot be followed, the chairman must submit a statement explaining why this could not be done for the committee file.

The approval of a majority of the quorum present shall be required for a committee to decide a question or to take official action on any matter; provided however, that a member who has filed a Declaration of Intent pursuant to the Ethics Guidelines that the members will not participate, shall not be required to vote and shall not be counted for purposes of determining the number necessary or for establishing a quorum to act on that question. *Members of a committee, regardless of co-sponsoring legislation, may either testify or participate in questioning during a hearing, but not both.*

Rep. Read spoke in favor.

On a division vote, with 78 members having voted in the affirmative, and 222 in the negative, the amendment to House Rules failed.

Rep. Weber moved the adoption of an amendment to House Rule 112.

## AMENDMENT TO HOUSE RULES

Amend House Rules by adding a new House Rule 112 to read as follows:

112. Continuity of the House in case of emergency. In the case of an emergency declared by the Governor of the State of New Hampshire or the President of the United States, the Speaker shall, with the consent of the Majority Leader and the Minority Leader, take such action as is necessary to ensure the continued operations of the House. Members of the House may, by a two-thirds vote, overrule any such actions.
