Thursday, June 10, 2021

REMARKS

Representative Query: Thank you, Mister Speaker. June marks Pride Month for the LGBTQ+ community. Pride is a celebration of our diversity, but Pride is more than that. Pride is about struggling against oppression, standing up for who we are, fighting for the rights that we deserve and making our voices heard. Pride is a time to commemorate those who came before us, those who lost their lives, those who survived persecution and those who fought for our rights and for a seat at the table. Fifty-two years ago, the NYPD conducted one of their frequent raids of the Stonewall Inn where they would arrest patrons who wore clothing that was not assigned to their gender, those dancing with members of the same sex or those showing affection towards each other. But on June 26, 1969, police came in with a plan of violence, not to make arrests. Patrons and people from the neighborhood, led by 2 transwomen of color rose up against police oppression and started one of the events in the gay liberation movement.

Speaker Steven Smith: With my apologies, can I ask the member to suspend for a moment? There is a lot of noise. The member is entitled to give his Unanimous Consent and some of you are having conversations near open mics. Please just give him the time he deserves. I'm sorry Representative. Please continue.

Representative Query: Patrons and people from the neighborhood led by 2 transwomen of color rose up against police oppression and started one of the events in the gay liberation movement. This past weekend was the 40th anniversary of the first public reported AIDS case, a pandemic that ran unchecked throughout the LGBTQ+ community, faced a similar challenge to the COVID-19 pandemic. Both faced a presidential administration that ignored science and failed to act resulting in exponential rise in the number of positive cases. AIDS was the number one cause of death in Americans age 25-44 in the 1980s to the 1990s. Due to this governmental failure to act, a whole generation of LGBTQ+ people were lost. In two days we will be commemorating the fifth anniversary of the Pulse nightclub shooting in Orlando, FL. There 49 people lost their lives celebrating what Pride meant to them. This was the largest mass shooting targeting LGBTQ+ people in American history yet we still have no safety from the gun violence epidemic. Six years ago the supreme court ruled that the fundamental right to marry is guaranteed to every American citizen no matter their sexual orientation or gender identity. Despite this we continue to see certain county and city clerks across the country deny these constitutionally guaranteed rights. These clerks use their own personal beliefs to violate their oaths of office and defy the laws they were charged with upholding. Pride is more than a parade. It is a place for our community to call out and look back on the injustices that we have fought against and the struggle continues. In the last decade nearly 300 trans people, the majority of whom were black, indigenous and people of color have been murdered in the United States, most of which have gone unsolved, highlighting the systemic issues within our society and that if society deems you as other, every day is a fight for your dignity. Thank you.
