The community college system of New Hampshire shall annually submit a report listing the New Hampshire high schools that are partners in the math learning communities program to the department of education, the house education committee and the senate education committee no later than October 1. School building projects authorized and funded under the applicable provisions of this subdivision in effect prior to June 30, 2023 shall continue until their completion according to the terms and funding schedules approved by the department of education.
- 166 Classrooms for Kids Grants. RSA 198:15-b is repealed and reenacted to read as follows:
- 10 198:15-b Classrooms for Kids Grants.
 - I. In addition to any other education aid program, each year the commissioner of the department of education shall calculate a classrooms for kids grant for schools and provide that amount of aid to a municipality's school districts as follows:
 - (a) \$300 for each pupil in the municipality's ADMR, as defined in RSA 198:38, I-a, in grades kindergarten through grade 8.
 - (b) \$350 for each pupil in the municipality's ADMR, as defined in RSA 198:38, I-a, in grades 9 through grade 12.

This shall not include general maintenance costs such as routine repairs, landscaping, or winter maintenance.

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- IV. Grants under this section shall be distributed to school districts pursuant to the payment schedule under RSA 198:42, and to chartered public schools pursuant to the payment schedule under RSA 194-B:11, I(c)
- V. The amount necessary to fund the grants under this section is hereby appropriated to the department from the education trust fund created under RSA 198:39. The state shall also pay tuition amounts pursuant to RSA 198:40-a, II(a) plus an additional grant of \$2,036 directly to the Virtual Learning Academy Charter School for each full-time equivalent pupil. Beginning July 1, 2017 and every July 1 thereafter, the department of education shall adjust the per pupil amount of the additional grant [based on the average annual change in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers, Northeast Region, using the "services less medical care services" special aggregate index, as published by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, United States Department of Labor.
