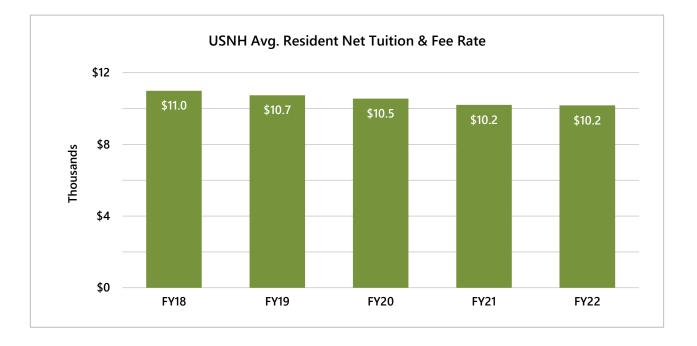

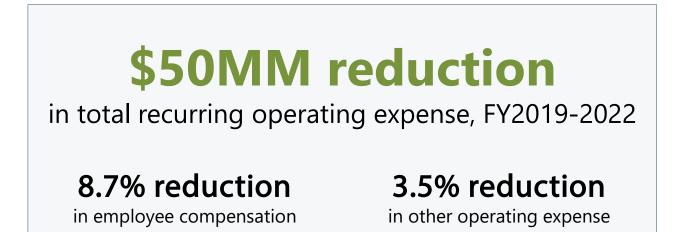




Five years of flat tuition and significant increases in financial aid have reduced net tuition to meet our mission of affordable, accessible high-quality education.

...by reducing costs...





USNH spends about **\$3,100 annually per student** on day-to-day operational expenses, compared to the New England 4-year public average of **\$4,150**.



\$15 million+

Anticipated inflationary impact on core operating expenses, **excluding personnel**, in FY2023

Yet USNH has reduced expenses, held tuition flat and increased financial aid.

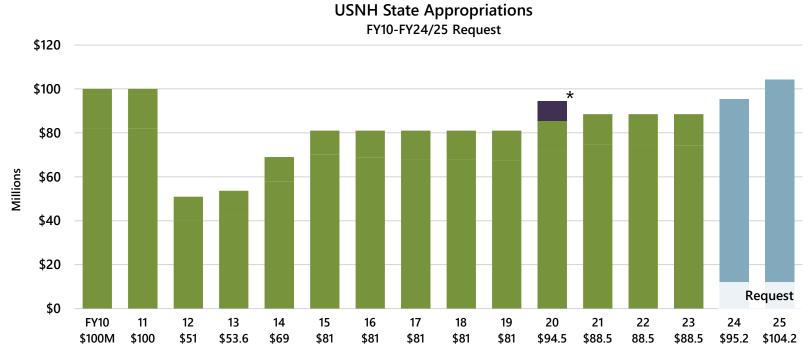

- 56% of college-going NH high school graduates leave NH.
- With fierce competition in the northeast, USNH needs additional resources to compete on price.

Funding will continue the tuition freeze and maintain financial aid for New Hampshire students.



- USNH is the state's largest attractor of young talent.
 - » Over 11,000 students from around the country are learning in NH today because of our institutions.
- Investments made by UNH to increase internships and show students what NH employers offer are paying off.

Funding will build and strengthen workforce partnerships in the Monadnock, Lakes and North Country regions.



- Cooperative Extension is the state's leading outreach and engagement organization
 - » Over 20,000 Granite Staters benefit each year.
- Funding remains below 2011 levels, hampering Extension's ability to respond to state needs.

Funding will expand programming to address health, well-being, and aging challenges in partnership with local communities.



Additional funding for public higher education must be a top priority to support NH's workforce needs and quality of life.

Support for NH students through sustained <u>increases in aid</u> to retain H.S. graduates.
Support for business collaboration to <u>train and retain</u> all USNH graduates.
Support to <u>address the health and well-being</u> challenges of our residents.



Whittemore Center - \$8 million

- This project, begun in 2022, is the first facility upgrade since opening in 1995.
 - Lack of investment has hampered recruiting and program success at the regional and national levels.
- \$30MM renovation will upgrade the ice surface and equipment, HVAC systems, and student-athlete facilities.
- Improving one of the state's largest sports and entertainment venues will:
 - Bring more visitors and revenue to the state.
 - Attract and retain outstanding student-athletes.
 - Support admissions and build pride in our state and UNH.



Blockchain Quality Assurance Center - \$1.5 million

- Recommendation of the Commission on Cryptocurrencies and Digital Assets
- Utilizes existing expertise at the UNH Interoperability Lab (IOL) to:
 - rapidly expand testing and quality assurance services to meet industry demand.
 - establish NH as an attractive destination for Blockchain entrepreneurs and businesses.
- Funding would support staff salaries and benefits for three years, after which the Center would be fully funded by industry, the same model used by the IOL today.

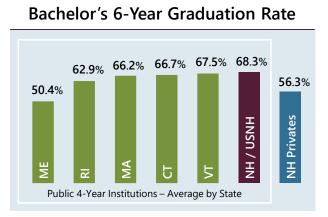

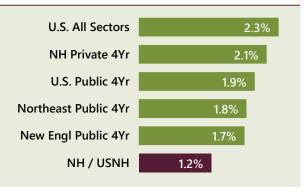
USNH Quality Metrics

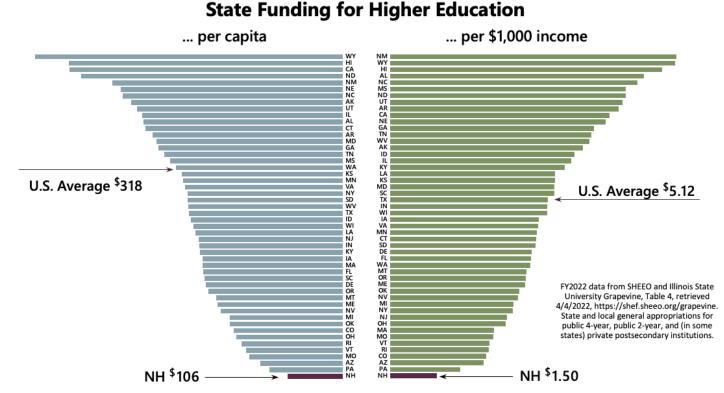

Last in State Support

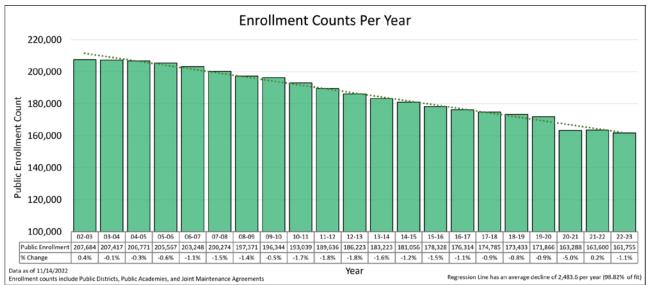

NH's student enrollment declines are occurring across the region.

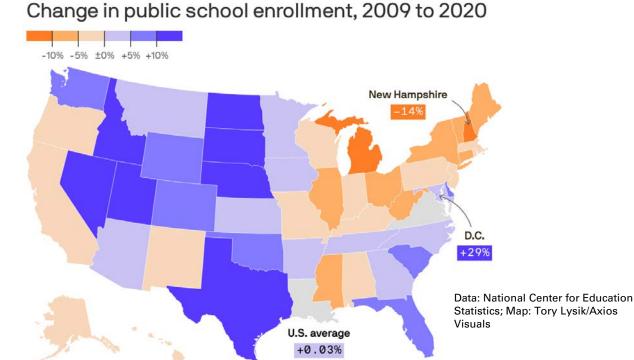


NH K-12 Public School Enrollment, NHDOE

Regional Competition

Over 56% of recent NH HS grads enrolled out of state, compared to the national average 25%.

- Lower state support leads to higher in-state tuition.
- Higher in-state tuition makes it easier for other states to compete for NH students.
- Additionally, other states provide more support to their students.

Changes in FTE Employees



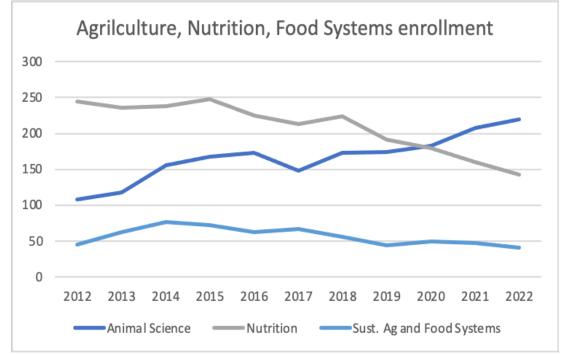
